### From the Chair: Richard Clarke

I have just been to our Burns ceilidh dance where we welcomed nearly two hundred dancers, many of whom join us every year at this event. This resulted in posting 'sold out' on the website and the door at Pont Street - I am sorry to those of you who could not get a ticket. The demand for the event was a great endorsement of the organisers and the reputation of the catering team to deliver a delicious haggis supper to two hundred people in half an hour. The ceilidh was just four weeks after the Branch's Scottish country dance in December which prepared us for Christmas. I hope your own plans for Christmas and Hogmanay also went smoothly and you enjoyed the celebrations.

Talking of plans, we are working on London Branch dancers attending the White Rose Festival in Leeds on 12 July. In broad terms the format of the festival is a series of dances in the afternoon interspersed by Highland dance displays and demonstration dances followed by a more traditional evening dance. It successfully attracts teams from the UK and overseas and is now in its 69th year. Full details are on our website.

Another dancing day for your diary is the London Branch's day school and dance at Maria Fidelis (near Euston) on 18 October. With classes for dancers (for three levels of experience) and musicians during the day these groups combine in the evening for a traditional Scottish country dance which is open to the public. Before then there is the Combined Societies dance organised by the Highland Club on 1 March and then on 28 May our Summer Wednesday dance both of which take place at St Columba's Church in Knightsbridge.

Most readers of the Reel are also members of The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society London Branch, which is an independent charity. Every edition of the Reel includes a box highlighting the objectives to promote Scottish country dancing in the London area. This edition also includes the notice of the annual meeting of the members during which an account will be given of our activities over the last year, followed by the opportunity to select the volunteers organising the charity as well as participate in an debate on our future priorities. We depend on the support of members for the charity to achieve its objects and to enable our calendar of events to continue. That includes:

- participating in the AGM
- helping run the charity overall and individual events, either formally (eg by standing for the committee) or taking on specific tasks (eg managing social media accounts, participating in the organisation of an event etc)
- advocating for Scottish country dancing to your contacts
- helping others to dance whether your partner, a dancing set or as a class teacher or
- attending events
- motivating and thanking our volunteers

Without everyone's involvement we cannot succeed - please take a moment to think about the ways in which you can contribute.

### **Branch AGM Notice**

The Annual General Meeting of the London Branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society will be held on Saturday 14 June 2025 at 6.45pm in the Upper Hall at St Columba's Church Hall, Pont Street, London SW1X OBD. It will be followed by our End of Season Dance which will also take place in the Upper Hall. Members and friends of the Branch are invited to attend both events but only members may vote at the AGM. If you cannot get to the meeting, we will still be pleased to see you at the dance.

The meeting usually lasts about 45 minutes. You will learn about the work of the Branch and our plans for the future. The Committee welcomes your comments and opinions, either through a formal motion, which must be received in writing by the Branch Secretary by 31 March 2025, or during general discussion at the meeting. The motion should be signed by the proposer and seconder, both of whom must be members of the Branch. Only motions submitted in advance and appearing on the agenda can be voted upon. An agenda for the meeting and a report covering the Branch's activities will be circulated with the next issue of The Reel.

Members are also encouraged to stand for election as an office holder or Committee member. Nominees should provide the Secretary with a written nomination by 31 March 2025 signed by the nominee, a proposer and a seconder, all of whom must be Branch members. There are twelve positions in total on the Committee (Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer and Secretary and eight ordinary members). We hope that members will step forward and join the Committee to contribute to its work and support Scottish country dancing. If there are more candidates than places, ballot papers will be issued to all Branch members with the next issue of The Reel. It is also possible to help with various aspects of the running of the Branch without necessarily being on the Committee.

### Burns Ceilidh Dance - 11 January 2025

The RSCDS London Burns Night Ceilidh at St Columba's Church was once again an enjoyable and memorable experience and is now a fixture in our calendar. This was my second visit, and I felt lucky to have secured one of the last tickets to a sold-out evening. It is perfectly clear why it is increasingly popular, bringing together people of all ages and abilities, into a joyful and inclusive atmosphere.

The dancing was expertly guided by James Fairbairn, whose clear and confident calling kept even the most hesitant dancers engaged and in step. I came along alone this year, but didn't miss a dance, partnering several new-found friends. My own coordination may have faltered at times (as Joanne Lawrence's photo below kindly reveals), but in my mind's eye, I danced flawlessly - and never stopped smiling.

The traditional half-time haggis with tatties and neeps was delicious and abundant, including my preferred vegetarian option. On Saturday 11 January 2025, I attended my first Burns Ceilidh Dance at St Columba's Church Hall in London. This joyful gathering was a crowning achievement of my efforts over the past year to learn Scottish dancing. In January 2024, during those winter weeks when people usually return to their daily routines, my friend Joanne invited me to join The Tuesday Social, a monthly Scottish country dance session on the same day. At the time, among other personal struggles, I was in a hurry to find a new place to live. So, I politely thanked the invitation and excused myself. However, something changed my mind, and I have no regrets whatsoever.

Scottish country dancing has allowed me to enter a fascinating world. As a Mexican, I dance by moving my arms, hips, and legs freely according to the sensual rhythms of Latin American ballads rather than following group progressive patterns. Additionally, I have attended the open-air dancing sessions at Kensington Gardens and a couple of ceilidh sessions in Vauxhall. The venue was full of cheerful people, as all the tickets had been sold in advance. The Caledonian Reelers entertained each dance, which mixed beginners, intermediate and advanced dancers. We were delighted by the traditional Scottish dish of haggis, neeps and tatties for supper. This was preceded by a bagpipe piece and the ritual to honour the meal with a poem by Robert Burns. I was even fortunate to receive a birthday cake from friends during the interval. I can fully confirm that practising Scottish dancing is one of the best ways to start the year.

This album brings together 14 new dances and tunes by a wide range of dance devisers and composers, which together provide some wonderful colour for the history of the Branch over 100 years. Dances are deliberately varied and style "range from in traditional to modern, from simple to more complex, ready to enhance many dancing occasions." Several the dances were



displayed at the 2024 Annual Gathering and can be seen on YouTube.

Muriel Johnstone and Pete Clark are both among the composers, and they team up for six of the tracks on the album, with Peter Shand and Tim Macdonald providing six more (a taste of which is available as they provided the music for the Autumn Gathering display). This makes for interesting listening, given the different styles, particularly between the fiddlers: of the two, Pete Clark has the smoother style, and a more rounded tone. Over the years, we have heard him to great effect in several recordings of the tunes of fiddle greats - Mackintosh, the Gows etc. - but it is great to hear him leading on these tracks for dancers.

I was not previously familiar with Tim's playing, which is freer in its approach, with adaptations of several tunes to provide variety, and adding life in some cases through double-stopping and open strings, notably in the set of tunes by James Gray for *Joppa Rocks*. Only three tunes are used in this dance, so the original comes around on turns 1, 4 and 8, which may surprise some dancers.

The balance somewhat favours the fiddles, but Muriel and Peter Shand are perfect partners throughout, taking occasional moments to add colour, for example Muriel in a set of 'lyrical strathspeys' for Esmé Randall's Strathspey.

The choice of tunes extends the Edinburgh-related composers further, with other originals from Moira Reekie and Iain MacPhail, and alternatives from Muriel and Pete Clark as well as Doreen McKerron, often reflecting friendships and mutual appreciation of those involved, perfectly integrated with traditional tunes.

Perpetua, devised by Elizabeth Harry for her husband Brian, features both fiddles, with Muriel alongside, and makes the most of the opportunities of the instruments playing together and dividing to present counter-melodies in a beautifully arranged and played set of tunes.

Further opportunity for interplay is heard to good advantage in *The Roaring Twenties*, where all four players combine and have a chance to shine, starting with the tune *The Boogie Brown* by Andrew Nolan and heading into some classic reels. Written by Rachel Shankland for Ilona Brown, the dance also remembers the themed ball held in Edinburgh for the Centenary Spring Fling, and provides a suitably rousing finale to a most enjoyable disc.

Circassian Circle (8x32R), Riverside Jig (8x32J), Dashing White Sergeant (5x32R), Ping (4x32J), Joe McDiarmid's Jig (4x32J), Craven Twelvesome (4x32R), Orcadian Strip the Willow (8x64J) plus a range of ceilidh dances and listening tracks.

For some years now RSCDS Aberdeen Branch has run a very successful ceilidh class, which offers a mixture of old favourites, new ceilidh dances and Scottish country dancing. They have sponsored this CD to show off the range of dances, and also the Crynoch Ceilidh Band, comprising lan Thomson and Rob Ross (accordions), Willie Johnstone (fiddle), Ann Thomson (piano), Brian Cruickshank (bass) and Scott Gordon (drums).



Accordionist and composer John Burns joins them from the producer's box for a classy rendition of his waltz *Ivor Scollay*, and his compositions appear on several other tracks. Prize for the best name is the two-step *The Sniffer*, the Blower, the Gulper and the Tantaliser, a reference to soup consumption, and a great tune to boot!

Ian has also contributed some of his own tunes, including the opening marches, and a set entitled *Ping*, where a tune of that name is followed by Pong (of course), Sheila's Make Up Case and Billy's Twinkle Toes - Sheila Bain being the driving force behind the ceilidh class. There is also a well-matched pair of waltzes for two brothers, Iain and Grant Macdougall from Lochgilphead.

It is an excellent, balanced sound, and the band has a great swing and drive, suitable for the range and context of the recording, and well within the range of tempo to make it suitable either for a lively evening's country dancing or a ceilidh night. There's plenty for the listener too, culminating in a contemplative slow air, *Margaret Smith's Reunion*.

### Gerrards Cross 50th Anniversary

When Joan Desborough guided her new class through their first attempts at Scottish country dancing in 1975, she probably did not expect to be back in the same venue 50 years later, accompanied by some of her original class members. However, this did in fact happen on January 19th, when the Gerrards Cross and Chalfonts Scottish Country Dance Club celebrated its 50th anniversary with a Tea Dance.

Gold is the colour of 50th anniversaries, so the club chose to reflect this in their large 5 and 0 balloons on the stage, in the smaller balloons decorating the room and the yellow freesia buttonholes presented to the club's special guests. As well as original class members, these guests included two musicians with a long history of playing for the club, Ken Martlew and Barbara Manning. On this occasion, though, the music was provided by lan and Tom Robertson.

All agreed that the band had played excellently, and had helped them find their way through a slightly challenging programme. This had been composed of dances designed to pay tribute to the RSCDS, past and present musicians, teachers, secretaries, and committee members. Chairwoman Suzanne Todd said that while reflecting on the past, the club also looks to the future. She was delighted that several new dancers were present and was particularly happy to welcome dancers from the Chalfont class.

As dancers left, the adjectives heard most were 'joyous', 'friendly' and 'relaxing'. Exactly the mood organisers Suzanne Todd and Rose Kreloff had hoped to achieve. (see picture on p8)

### Letters to The Reel

Square Sets - is there another way?

There is a trend developing which requires square sets to be formed initially as longwise ones. It is said that this allows a more orderly forming of the square set. It is not clear whether this is a recommendation of the RSCDS or an invention of a dance teacher.

The traditional way was simply to announce the next dance as a square set and dancers would pair up and stand in a square set formation. Spatially, there was always jostling for a comfortable space in the room, a little undignified maybe, but if the eight dancers formed a ring and these rings positioned themselves equidistant from other rings it did not seem a problem. So, why is this trend in forming a set occurring?

Personally, I am not sure. If it 'ain't broken' why fix it? Shortcomings in forming longwise sets by counting down the line are:

- 1. Couples who are counted as 1/2/3&4 with this method, actually become 1/2 or 4&3. Confused? Well, that is the feeling dancers get as they then transform from longwise sets to squares.
- 2. In square sets as said, men are on the left of their partners yet when lined up as longwise sets, only the third couple is in this relationship.
- 3. As longwise sets are then instructed to become square sets, confusion reigns as an undignified Piccadilly Circus of people occurs.
- 4. How does this 'simpler' system work for triangular sets or sets of five or six couples such as *Gavin's Reel or The Iona Cross*?
- 5. The grandness of a *Grand March* opening out into a square set is lost if this required reorganisation is called for.

The truth behind this trend is that it is assumed that dancers are incapable of forming up a square set on their own, which is clearly nonsense. Dancers are amazingly adaptable and are quite capable of sorting themselves out when a square or any other shape set is required. But what do other dancers think?

With reference to Stephen Webb's letter in *Reel* 330, I can remember being a beginner and not always liking it when I was helped. However, help is sometimes needed, particularly if a set is breaking down or more than one couple in the set does not know the dance. In these circumstances it may be best to briefly call out instructions, using the dancers' names if necessary to ensure the attention of the right person. Saying which, I was once faced with a set in which three of the four men were called lan!

### The Story behind the Dance - Caledonian Quadrilles: Meryl Thomson

A series of articles from Meryl Thomson delving behind the history of some of our dances and their music. This time she turns her attention to a Scottish themed quadrille which took the nineteenth century by storm

In 1822 King George IV decided to visit Scotland. He was the first reigning monarch to do so for almost 200 years. This royal visit, aided by the organisation of Sir Walter Scott, enhanced his popularity and also led to an explosion

of interest in all things Scottish, including dances and music.

One of the outcomes was the addition to the quadrille repertoire of sets of quadrille music using Scotch airs. Although Scottish musicians, such as Nathaniel Gow, had produced sets of quadrilles earlier (from 1817 onwards) they had used French music, as did their English counterpoints Mr Duval, Edward Payne and James Paine. Nathaniel Gow's quadrille sets had complicated figures and did not stand the test of time as people preferred familiar easier dance figures in the ballroom. Two quadrille sets, later more commonly known as First Set and The Lancers, remained popular throughout the nineteenth century and are still danced in some form today. As we shall see, a set of quadrilles with easy figures, danced to Scottish tunes, was to also become a mainstay of the quadrille repertoire - The Caledonians.

One of the first to produce a set of quadrilles using Scotch tunes was John H Gow, grandson of fiddler Niel Gow, in 1817. His father John led a popular dance band based in London and they ran a music shop together (read more about the Gows here regencydances.org/paper022.php). The familial link between brothers Nathaniel and John Gow led to music being passed from one end of the country to another with London influencing Edinburgh and vice versa.

Joseph Hart, a London-based composer of his own set of Lancers, produced eight sets of quadrilles using Scotch airs where either First Set or his own new figures could be danced. He is also one of the first to publish quadrilles with Scotch airs, his first set being advertised in 1821.

It became common for quadrilles with Scotch airs to be called Caledonian quadrilles and the earliest set I have found with this title is by the Glaswegian dance band leader and composer William Cunningham. I identified Cunningham in a previous Reel article as being the first person to publish The Nut (RSCDS Book 1) in Scotland, printed in Glasgow in the early 1820s. Cunningham and his band performed at various Balls and Assemblies in the Glasgow area. He composed many tunes and published several sets of quadrilles including at least four sets of Caledonian quadrilles, all danced to First Set figures. His first, A New Set of Caledonian Quadrilles - As performed by Cunningham and his Band at the Assemblies and Fashionable Parties - was published around 1820 and contains the Scottish tunes Gin a Body Meet a Body (aka Coming Through the Rye), March to the Battlefield, When she came ben she bobbit (used as the original tune for the RSCDS dance Lady Catherine Bruce's Reel), Up and War them A' Willie, and The East Neuk of Fife (used as the original tune for the RSCDS dance Fife Ness). Cunningham used traditional Scottish tunes, albeit with some bars of his own composition to help them fit the structure of the quadrille figures. Quadrille music traditionally has a section in

a minor key before returning to the main tune to finish each time through and this required Cunningham to add 8 or 16 bars of his own composition, which he annotates as such on the music.

Cunningham's second set of Caledonian Quadrilles was probably published after 1830, given that two of the figures are entitled *Princess Victoria* and *William the Fourth*. His fourth set is dedicated to "The Nobility and Gentry of Scotland" and was published in Glasgow and sold by Robert Purdie in Edinburgh. Cunningham is described on the title page as "Conductor of Music at Balls & Assemblies in the west

of Scotland". This fourth set uses tunes such as *The White Cockade* (RSCDS Book 5) and *Bonny Dundee* (used for *The Isle* in RSCDS Graded book and a tune often used as lead on music for demonstrations by the late dance teacher and devisor Ann Dix).

The quadrille figures which became popular throughout the nineteenth century as *The Caledonians* were devised by George Chivers, first published as a separate set in c.1821 and then in his *Modern Dancing Master* in 1822 and in his *The Quadrille Preceptor* of c.1824.

Chivers (see photo left bottom) ran a dancing academy in London and was a rival of Thomas Wilson, many of whose dances have been used as sources for RSCDS dances in their earlier books. You can read a fascinating history of Mr Chivers and his life and works, researched by Paul Cooper, regencydances.org/ paper015.php

In his Modern Dancing Master Chivers titles these new figures as "Chivers Seventh Set of Quadrilles, The Original Caledonians". There are five figures and he includes music based on traditional Scottish tunes, many recognisable to SCD dancers today:



- The first figure of Chivers' Caledonians is danced to the reel tune My Love She's But a Lassie Yet. This well known tune is the original for the dance of the same name from RSCDS Book 9 and is the tune usually used for the ceilidh dance Cumberland Square Eight. The earliest version of the tune is in Robert Bremner's Scots Reels of 1757 as Miss Farquharson's Reel and it was published by James Aird c. 1785. This tune was probably the most used tune in subsequent publications of The Caledonian Quadrilles.
- The second figure is danced to the jig tune Logie of Buchan. This tune was a song with words written by George Halket who was a schoolmaster and known Jacobite, and Robert Burns added verses from another older song to this. The song and tune were first published in James Johnson's The Scots Musical Museum in c. 1794.




- The third figure is danced to the jig tune *The Banks of the Dee*. The tune was published in dance collections by Thomas Skillern, and by Charles and Samuel Thompson (under the title New Lango Lee) and is a known Cotswold Morris dance tune from the Oxford village of Leafield. The original song was said to be composed by a John Tait in 1775 and set to the Irish air Langolee.
- The fourth figure is danced to the jig tune When I Parted. This
  is thought to be a composition by the Scottish fiddler John
  Anderson in 1790. The tune is also very similar to a tune
  called Tom come tickle me in David Young's 1740 manuscript.
- The fifth figure is danced to the reel Gordon of Lesmor. I have been unable to trace the origin of this tune, although with its dotted rhythm it is possibly the most Scottish sounding of the five chosen by Chivers.

While the tunes are Scottish in origin, the figures are in typical quadrille style, similar to those danced in England since 1815. The popularity of Scotland and its music created an opportunity for dance musicians and publishers in England to jump on the bandwagon and use this to sell their wares. Publishers picked tunes they thought were suitably Scottish in style, even though they were usually arranged in a way which sounds distinctly Victorian and were shoehorned into the quadrille format.

Thomas Wilson was scathing of Chivers' Caledonian Quadrilles, going so far as to remark in his 1824 Danciad, "The author of certain Scotch Quadrilles, as he terms them, in order to prove their nationality, appears to have wholly relied on the tunes, and the print of a Scotch bagpiper in the title page - they should recollect the old adage 'Good wine needs no bush'.




He then goes on to say, "There are several sets of what are termed **'Scotch** Quadrilles', which are only Scotch as to name and tune, having no other national characteristic, heing French composed of Quadrille figures and steps. In order to enable those who are conversant with Scotch dancing, to judge how far these are entitled to the appellation of Scotch, the reader is here presented with the figures of Caledonians". Of course. Wilson had his own set of Royal Scotch Quadrilles which he felt were far superior and of

which he says "The following is a set of what the author terms 'Scotch Quadrilles', which are adapted to Scotch steps, and he submits them to the judgement of those, who are acquainted with the National characteristic". Unusually, these figures contain reels. He does not however offer music to accompany these instructions nor give notes on what 'Scottish' steps should be used. There is no evidence Wilson's version was taken up in preference to Chivers'.

Later Caledonians sets went a step further and used more than one tune in the same quadrille figure. Thomas Westrop published his set

The Caledonian of Quadrilles in c.1830 in London with an exuberant figure in highland dress and giant feathers in his cap on the cover (see right).

His first figure uses eight bars of My Love is But a Lassie Yet, but then adds in Duncan Gray for bars 9-24 before returning to the first tune for the last eight bars. His second figure uses Gordon of Lesmore for the first and third repetitions and There's Nae Luck about the House for second and fourth repetitions. His third figure uses Last May a Braw Wooer and Logie o' Buchan. His fourth has Roy's Wife of Aldivalloch for times one and three and The De'ils



Awa' with the Exciseman for times two and four. Finally, his fifth figure uses the reel Green Grow the Rushes O segueing into the jig The Campbells are Coming. The upshot of this change of rhythm within the dance is that the music becomes very choppy to listen to, and makes it more difficult for the dancer, particularly as the music goes from reel to jig to reel in the space of 48 bars and then is repeated four more times. Previous quadrilles for First set and the Lancers did not change rhythm within a figure. This did become a feature of post 1850 quadrille music however.

As the nineteenth century progressed, The Caledonians became a staple of the ballroom. Instructions included in all the dance manuals of the period are invariably Chivers' instructions but Joseph Lowe in his Quadrille Preceptor of 1838 includes an alternative set of

instructions in addition to Chivers'.

John H Gow was still active in publishing 1842. Caledonian Quadrilles set to Chivers' figures. You can see from the cover that although the men are in Highland dress. the women are wearing Victorian dresses and have hairstyles from this period. Comparing this to his 1817 set mentioned above, Caledonians uses the same tunes and with pretty much the same arrangement of music as other versions - My Love is But a Lassie Yet, There's Nae Luck about the House, Kenmure's Awa, The Highland Laddie and Callam Shiarghlas.

By 1858, sets of Caledonians were being published across the pond in America. Laurence de Garmo Brooks published his set in New York and included the tunes My Love She's But a Lassie Yet, The Campbells are Coming (RSCDS Book 24 but to a different tune), Logie o' Buchan, The Lass o' Gowrie (used for Mr Watson's Favourite in the Graded Book), The Birks of Aberfeldy and Rob Roy MacGregor (RSCDS book 26 but using a different tune).

In 1879, James Scott Skinner published instructions for The

Caledonians in his The Ball Room Companion (dancing taught without a master) containing all fashionable dances of the day in Aberdeen. The terseness of the instructions suggest that this was a set of quadrilles very strongly embedded in the ballroom repertoire and which perhaps only needed a quick reminder of the figures.

On a personal note, as a musician and, having this set of played quadrilles on several occasions, I can attest to a certain dissatisfaction with the choice of tunes and the way they are used in these quadrilles. They feel as they sound, tunes cut about to fit in with the

places and turn partners. 5th Fig.—Top couple lead round in centre Indies advance in centre, curtsey and retire, gentlemen advance in centre, sainte and retire set to partners and turn, half chain round, half promenade, chassez croisse, promenade

way quadrilles need to be played. In these Caledonian sets, particularly the later ones, the original section in a minor key is often replaced by changing from one Scottish tune to another. The feel is clunky and when we decided to make a recording of the Caledonian Quadrilles in 2019 we chose to replace Chivers' original music with pipe tunes from the correct period which felt much more in keeping with the style of the dance.

Without doubt a great part of the attraction of these quadrilles when first encountered must have been the inclusion of traditional Scottish music which cemented them in the ballroom repertoire, however the quadrilles themselves have nothing particularly Scottish in the figures, there are no reels for example. The simplicity of the figures though led to this set of quadrilles becoming a staple in the nineteenth century ballroom and they are still danced today (most recently at Mrs Bennet's Ballroom St Andrew's Regency Ball in Putney in November 2024).

This set of quadrilles is another example of the linking of music and dances between England and Scotland as one country influenced the other.

THE CALEDONIANS.

1st Fig,-Top and bottom couple hands across, set to your partners and turn, ladies chain, half promenade, half right and left.

2nd Fig.—Top gentleman advance and perform any step, a la pastorale, set corners and change partners, promenade each couple; repeat the same four times.

3rd Fig.-First lady and opposite gentleman advance and retire, advance a second time and turn in the centre, top couple lead between opposite couple, returning outside, set to cor-

advance and stop, partners do the same, turn partners to places, hadies to the right, gentlemen to the left, repeat, half promenade to

### Branch Committee 25 October 2024

The main business of the 25 October 2024 meeting was the arrangements for appointing delegate members to attend the AGM of the RSCDS and the recommendations on how they should vote to represent the members in London. The main discussion was on the candidates for the various committee positions, where there was competition for some of the posts, and the voting procedure, which is by proxy in advance of the actual meeting in Edinburgh. There was also a debate on the proposal to raise the membership subscription by £1 per annum. It is a requirement of the contract with the London Branch, that we collect this and pass the money on to Edinburgh. One of the impacts of the recurring increases above inflation is to inhibit us increasing the local membership fee which is available to support activities in London. We have been pressing for evidence of the achievements and benefits from the funds rather than supporting documents based on costs. A narrow majority of the committee decided to support the increase. We will continue to advocate that subscriptions are based on value for money in achieving outcomes.

We are experiencing challenges with our bank, both with making mandate changes and the possible imposition of charges, and the possibility of moving the account was discussed. It was noted that many charities are being 'debanked'.

It was agreed the possibility of making it easier to support the charity by making donations through the website and encouraging legacies would be investigated. It is also proposed to write to the life members explaining the costs of printing and posting *The Reel* had increased significantly over the years and suggesting they switch to an electronic rather than a paper copy or consider making a donation.

We discussed the start of the season dance - this had been changed from the evening to the afternoon in 2024 but the event still didn't cover its costs. We decided to promote the dance on the evening of the day school in October as the first event in the autumn season and from 2026 incorporate a dance into the programme at Easter. (It would be confirmed with The Highland Club that their plans for a Combined Societies' Dance were proceeding for Easter 2025). The annual London Day School is directly aligned with our charitable objectives and the Committee agreed that it was appropriate to subsidise the event, however attendance has not recovered since the pandemic which is a concern. Some adjustments will be made to reduce costs but the main objective for the 18 October 2025 Day School will be to increase numbers.

The attendance at the recurring classes has generally been good although the interest in the Coates Crescent social media pilot to recruit dancers for the beginners' class had not translated into more paying attendees beyond those recruited by our own promotion.

There were reports on the preparations for future classes and dances which were progressing well. It was agreed that we would encourage online booking for dances - especially those with a significant catering requirement when predicting numbers was important.

The Chair reported that he had participated in a conference call organised by Edinburgh which was intended to become a regular event with the object of improving communication and addressing the concerns of the local groups.

### **Coming Events**

White Rose Festival: As mentioned in the last edition of *The Reel*, RSCDS London Branch intends to take a team of dancers to the White Rose Festival which takes place near Leeds on 12 July 2025 (see photo right). It is a lovely, non-competitive celebration of Scottish country dancing with opportunities for teams of demonstration, intermediate and less experienced dancers to enjoy working together on set dances and to watch others perform whilst relaxing in the company of dancers from around the UK.

We've had an encouraging response to our call for expressions of interest and will be entering a team in each of the available categories: beginners, massed dances and demonstration. Further details of plans for additional lessons and rehearsals will be shared via our website and eUpdates. Several of the set dances have also been incorporated into our Summer Wednesday dance programme and will feature in Branch classes.

Day School 2025: plans are advancing for our day school which takes place on 18 October at Maria Fidelis School near Euston station. We are delighted that Graham Donald, Raphaelle Orgeret and Faye Mather have agreed to teach, and that Ian Muir (Prestwick) will lead the musicians' workshop. We are looking forward to an active and enjoyable day.

output, engaging teaching style and generous mentorship of colleagues. He started Scottish dancing as a postgraduate student, meeting his wife Gillian through Malcolm Brown's classes in York, and continued dancing throughout his life, including during extended periods working overseas in Germany, Singapore, Australia and Hong Kong.

A professorship at LSE brought Chris and his family to London in 1989, where he became a familiar presence at Pont Street and other Scottish dancing activities. While generally a shy person, he was always active in welcoming newcomers, also in encouraging and supporting less experienced dancers on the floor. He was keen to share his enthusiasm for Scottish culture with his daughters Isobel and Christina, through mix-tapes, family holidays in Scotland, and even trying to receive Take the Floor from Radio Scotland on crackly medium wave.

Chris was an advanced student of the Gaelic language and in latter years became a committed member of London's Gaelic-speaking community. This interest extended to researching the early history of Gaelic organisations in London, including the Highland Club, and learning web development skills to create an updated website for the Gaelic Society of London.

Chris will be much missed by family, friends and colleagues. His funeral was held on 24 January 2025 at Moray crematorium, near the home of his shipbuilding forefathers.

Answer to 'Where is This?' on p1: Thomas Carlyle's house in Ecclefechan - a small village located 10 kilometres south of Lockerbie in Dumfries and Galloway in the south of Scotland.

The village is famous for being his birthplace. 'The Arched House' is a tourist attraction and has been maintained by the National Trust for Scotland since 1936.

Thomas Carlyle (1795 - 1881) was a Scottish historian, philosopher and mathematician who expressed himself as an essayist and satirist. In 1826 he married Jane Welsh and here is where the reference to the 'feline' part of the dance name comes in.

As found in *The Fireside Sphinx* (1901) by Agnes Repplier, "Among a series of house cats, Mrs Jane Carlyle took in a kitten, black as soot, a most agile kitten, and wonderfully confiding."

### A Gentle Lady

The following has been taken in part from the eulogy delivered by Reverend Sue the McWhinney (Patricia's daughter) at Patricia's funeral.

Patricia, an only child,

was born in Plymouth to parents Leslie and Annie. Her father being in the Royal Navy, it was three years before she first met him. Prior to and during the war years, the Pendal family moved six times including a term in Malta. Being unsettled, it had an her childhood impact on and education. After high school, Patricia went to college in Bath to train in home economics and housekeeping, working in Residential Further Education Colleges.

Patricia always looked for opportunities to meet people, but the social activity that she most enjoyed was Scottish dancing. This is how she and John met, at weekly dances at the RN training college. They were married in 1957 in Gosport; two years later with John seconded to the Australian navy they lived in Sydney, Brisbane and Singapore. They had two children, Sue first then Paul. In 1969 John left the RN and joined Kodak residing in Watford. This was the home that they lived in until their passing. John died in 2018 (see A Life to Enjoy in Reel 303 p16). I first met them at Watford & West Herts Scottish Society dances and found John and I shared many interests. John worked on the typesetting and presentation of The Reel and I visited their house every quarter to finalise the presentation with John and came to know Patricia in the domestic setting of their lovely house and garden where she felt most comfortable. I often stayed for lunch (which John and I were required to immediately come down for when ready). It was always food grown by John and Patricia, and whilst simple fare, was always delicious. Patricia was a kind and gentle lady who was well read and gave service to CAB and nursery care. It was clear that John had found the perfect lady for them both to have a happy life together. Although Sue and Paul lived separately, some distance away they still saw them when they could and their five grandchildren, whom they clearly loved and loved to spend time with.

After John died, Patricia stopped dancing and bravely managing for some months alone, she took a tumble in the garden whilst watering her beloved begonias, breaking her hip, which also put an end to her cycling. She was very grateful for the care received from Angie for the last five years, although Patricia did continue to involve herself in the activities of her local church. In September, Patricia suffered an aneurism and passed away peacefully at home. She was a special lady and a gentle one whom all who knew her will certainly

### John Renton

27 September 1942 - 17 January 2025



I first met John at the Summer School 2009 August and discovered he lived in a remote farmhouse in Inveraray. He was playing at St Andrews for the evening dances and as we chatted, I took an instant liking to him. He played strict tempo and like many other musicians loved seeing the pleasure on dancers' faces when he

played. A very accomplished accordionist and band leader with several recordings for the RSCDS to his name. He was proud of the fact that when he played for a particular dance, he would create a matched set of tunes always starting and ending with the named tune. He passed some 1,500 sets on to a fellow musician and friend when he realised due to arthritis, he could no longer play his beloved instrument. But, tunes were always in his head and when recalling one, he would simply sing or hum it - a wonderful and natural skill.

particularly enjoyed playing strathspeys which he interpreted musically so well. Besides his playing excellence, he was also a composer of many lovely tunes in the Scottish idiom. I first discovered this in a curious way when, one morning after returning to work in that month of August and about to call in on the way to a barber for a trim, I received a call on my mobile from, to my surprise, John! He said, "I've composed a hornpipe for you Stephen, because I think it will suit you," and then proceeded to play it while I stood in the street listening. It was quite surreal but charming too. It was the first of many tunes he would compose for me to accompany dances I have devised (please see Strathspey Server if you wish to know more). In addition, he generously composed tunes for The Berkhamsted Diamond Collection and their Platinum Anniversary and London Branch's winning anniversary entry, London Nine-O (see The Reel 318, p9).

In conversation, I learned of his impending 80th birthday and told HQ, so it was kindly marked by a letter from the then chair, Lorna Ogilvie. He was very pleased to receive it. For my contribution devised Our Compliments to John lan T Muir generously Renton and composed a lovely tune to accompany it. John was again delighted by both dance and tune. Further, I encouraged other musician friends to contact John as I knew it would be an enriching experience for both and relieve some of his loneliness.

John was a very talented Scot, modest, kind and genuine and I have always felt privileged to have known him, especially by engaging in many meaningful chats over these past 15 years and I, and no doubt many others, will truly miss dear John too.
