RECORD REVIEW

Music for 10 Scottish Country Dances—

Bobby Crowe and his Band—

RSCDS 3

Fife Ness (Reel 8 × 32), Staffin Harvest (STR 4 × 32), Her Majesty is Welcome (4 × 32 STR + 32 Reel), Cuillins of Skye (STR 8 × 32) General Stuart's Reel (8 × 32), Sugar Candie (8 × 32), Miss Hadden's Reel (8 × 32), Miss Milligan's Strathspey (8 × 32), Triumph (6 × 24), West's Hornpipe (4 × 32). The first four dances are from the 1978 Subscription Copy.

Exactly seven years ago (Reel 117) we reviewed nine records for dancing and said: "Top of the Pops in this lot is undoubtedly Bobby Crowe", and went on to say, "you will want to listen over and over again." Seven years on . . . buy this new record and you will want to listen over and over again. It really is excellent. Tempo is just right on each and every track. For reasons best known to the Society its records do not contain any of the good modern tunes composed by contemporary band leaders, but if you were disappointed with the quite dreary selection of traditional tunes on the record for Book 28 have no fears about this latest record. There are in fact hundreds of good traditional tunes and those chosen on this occasion are, without exception, good ones. We immediately recognise no fewer than six strathspeys by J. Scott Skinner. (We suspect there are one or two new compositions among the originals and do wish the Society (our Society!) would take the trouble to give us the sources of tunes.) Assisting Bobby, we have James Lindsay playing exceedingly competently on second accordion (not to be confused with Jimmy Lindsay who made the Book 28 record), Angus Fitchet on fiddle—the sleeve says violin—Peter Straughan on piano, Dave Barclay on bass and Colin Lander on drums. Sound engineer is Stuart Jeffrey, which means that the recording was done in Bryce Laing's Craighall studio in Edinburgh and this means first-rate recording quality. (Did you know that Craighall's reputation is such that EMI Records bring them, with their mobile studio, all the way to Earl's Court to record the Royal Tournament?). This record is very good value for money with about 50 minutes' playing time. It will surely appeal to dancers and to listeners alike.

The myth that the youth of today are only interested in the current brand of "pop" is truly a myth. There are an extraordinary number of young folk, many of them still at school, playing traditional Scottish music and thoroughly enjoying their music making.

Two delightful records made by small groups are recently to hand. The Wee County Scotia Players on DJM 22063 consists of four fiddles, a viola and a rhythm section. The Ochil Players on OU 2201 is similar with the addition of an accordion. Both groups come from Clackmannanshire. Alasdair Fraser, currently living in London, and lately playing with Frank Reid, is on the former, while his brother Iain is a member of the Ochil Players. Both records contain typical selections of Airs, Marches, Jigs, Strathspeys, Reels and Waltzes. My preference (sorry Alasdair) is for the Ochil Players, the sound is sweeter and cleaner and the recording is better—Craighall again.

On now to soloists: Donald Montgomery, a schoolboy and leader of the Ochil Players, is one of five fiddlers who feature on a recording of the National Fiddle Championships held in Edinburgh last year. The others are Douglas Lawrence from Stirling who took first prize, Angus Cameron, Yla Steven and Ian Laing. The record is NTS 130.

In our last review we mentioned hearing Robert Christie in the 1977 Jubilee Salute in Edinburgh. We have been severely chastised for failing to mention that Yla Steven was in the Salute also. Shame on us Indeed she was and indeed she is a magnificent fiddle player. Her record No. SR 142 is "sheer magic". She plays with a quite amazing depth and sense of feeling. Her slow airs make me want to cry and her marches really make me want to march. Her handling of Scott Skinners "Valley of Silence" is quite heart-rending.

In a different style, much more earthy, is Angus Grant from Fort William playing some stirring stuff on 12 TS 347.

If your preference is for accordionists, may we recommend Stuart Anderson, an 18-year-old, on LILP 5080 and, an even younger wizard, Gordon Pattullo, aged 16, on OU 2207. Yet another two excellent recordings from the Craighall stable.

Finally, and as we look at the sleeve... you have already guessed . . . we notice it is a Craighall recording, Alastair Hunter and the Lorne Scottish Dance Band play a very lively selection on OU 2208. Only two dancing tracks are Meg Merrilees (6 × 24) and Burns' Hornpipe (4 × 32). Definitely one of this season's Best Buys.

P.S. As we go to press we receive a copy of Ron Gonnella's latest record on the Lismor label. "A tribute to Niel Gow". LILP 5085. What can one say? There is probably no one else in Scotland today who can play such music—that of the Gows, Scott Skinner, Marshall, Simon Fraser and the rest—in the delightful manner of Ron. Dare we use the phrase again? "Sheer magic".

THE LANTERN OF THE NORTH

dance devised by John Drewry A dance written for a visit to Bavaria by Jennifer Wilsons team from Elgin. Jig-3 couples-32 bars.

BARS

- 1st, 2nd and 3rd couples set on the sides, then, giving right hands to partners, cross over to opposite sides.
- 1st, 2nd and 3rd couples set on opposite sides, then turn partners by the left hand half-way round into promenade position.
- 9-16 1st, 2nd and 3rd couples dance a promenade.

At the end:

1st couple cast off into second place on own sides; 2nd couple dance up to top place and stay facing out; 3rd couple dance out to place and stay facing out.

17-24 Reels of three on the sides. To begin:

1st couple, giving right hands, dance down crossing over to third place to dance the reels on wrong sides;

2nd couple dance out and down; 3rd couple dance out and up.

At the end:

1st couple dance in to face second corners;

2nd and 3rd couples dance extra loops on the end of the reels so that 2nd lady and 3rd man can keep on dancing into the next figure.

- 25-28 Second corners "pass and turn"at the end 1st couple turn quickly by the right arm to face first corners.
- 29-32 First corners "pass and turn"-at the end 1st couple dance to second place on own sides. Repeat, having passed a couple.

"PASS AND TURN"

1st couple dance out to the corner position, passing the corner by the right. They curve round to the right, then, on the third step, they dance in, passing the corner again by the right. On the fourth step of the half phrase, they dance as instructed above. (This is similar to dancing half a reel of four with corners so far as 1st couple are concerned.)

The corners dance in on the first step, passing 1st man or 1st woman by the right. On the second step the corners turn one another by the right hand. On the third step they dance out towards own sides, again passing 1st man or 1st woman by the right, then, on the fourth step they curve round by the right into the side lines. This means that the corners return to their starting places after four steps.

Dancing on the Distaff Side or Ladies' Fancy.

I wonder how many remember? Alas, now disappeared from the London scene (or mercifully, some might say!). Now, there (or mercifully, some might say!). Now, there was a man for you! He brooked no competition for the ladies; for him it simply didn't exist. He'd bustle through the door into Fetter Lane right on time at the beginning of the dance, walk purposefully to his customary seat under the platform, his booklets in hand, his programme and biro at the ready. A glance round the hall was sufficient and he'd be off. "Hello Mary. was sufficient and ne d be off. Hello Mary 1'll have the first dance with you and Jean can have number 2", he'd say, writing busily. "There you are Katy, you get No. 3 and Sue, I'll spare you No. 4". Yes, we obeyed meekly, we accepted it all, knowing that there were so many of us, and thinking of those empty gaps on our programmes and at least this was a firm offer! Yes, it's a man's world the statement of the stateme all right. REPORT ON A.G.M.

The 1977/78 A.G.M. of the Branch was held on Friday 23rd June, 1978 and was attended by over 50 members. (Note:— Branch Membership now totals over 1000). The attendance was about average for recent years, and members heard that although the year had been very successful, rising costs had resulted in almost double expenditure against a marginal rise in income. The Treasurer pointed out the main increase had been in the cost of producing and distributing the Reel. Various suggestions were discussed to reduce this cost, including the possibility of charging for the Reel, but no firm conclusion was reached. The new Committee, elected by the first postal ballot for over ten years, will certainly require to give serious consideration to the Branch expenditure under this item.

The outstanding success of the Bookstall as both a service to members and a means of increasing Branch income was appreciated by the meeting. The Branch is very much indebted to Stella Booth for the work she puts in to the service.

The approach of the Golden Jubilee of the Branch was brought to the notice of members and several ideas for celebrating this unique occasion were mentioned. The Committee will appoint a Jubilee Sub-Committee to explore various projects for 1979/80 but meantime any members with specific proposals should put these forward as soon as possible to any Committee member.

The meeting also discussed a suggestion for a "super-advanced" class to be held on Friday evenings at about monthly intervals. The result was that the meeting failed to appreciate the need for such a class in view of the existing provision for three advanced classes each week.

The new chairman, Mr. Bill Ireland, concluded the meeting with thanks to those attending, but appealed for a greater attendance of members at future meetings. He also emphasised that the meeting was the annual opportunity for members to put forward their point of view—a fact that was welcomed by the Committee.
