Chairman's Column by Jim Cook



As the new Chairman of the London Branch, I welcome you all to the new season which will take us into the Branch's 90th Anniversary year in 2020. Our 90th Anniversary attractions were announced in *Reel* 308, but be sure to see the advance announcement on *p6* of this *Reel* 309 concerning a new dance needed to be devised for the Branch.

As I come to this position from outside of the Committee, I am on a learning curve and I thank the rest of the Committee for their support and understanding. Thankfully, there is continuity as many of the key Executive Committee positions are unchanged. Also many of the much

appreciated team of helpers, who have volunteered to assist in numerous ways, are continuing. But we also need new blood and I am pleased to welcome Mel Rowland to the Committee. She dances at our Richmond Class.

In future, to permit a logical progression within the Committee up to Chairman, the post of Vice Chairman has now been reinstated and we must now co-opt new blood to this position. Also, two Committee places are vacant and two people need to be co-opted into these positions as well.

Many societies bemoan the fact that volunteers are now difficult to find. Is this due to people achieving their social aims through online social media rather than meeting real people? Groups such as ours thrive because of the dedicated helpers who help with refreshments, sell the tickets, plan events, contribute and publish *The Reel*, and so on. However these groups of helpers need a steady stream of new recruits to spread the workload and ensure that the Branch continues to grow and flourish. So come and help us, meeting the other members in the Branch in the process. Whatever your skills, from tea making to desktop publishing there is a niche for you. However large or small your contribution, please drop me a line and express an interest and we can take it on from there.

As ever, the challenge confronting us is to encourage new and younger dancers to join us. Should you be blessed with being a young dancer, you will have thoughts and ideas. Do not keep them to yourself. Get in touch if you would like to be co-opted on to the Committee where your ideas can be aired. And do not forget that we have a Vice Chairman position to fill. Do not be shy. Make yourself known! But be warned of the addiction. I started dancing when I was 18 years old and 51 years later I am still doing it...And I still do not point my toes correctly! We must encourage new dancers who come to the Wednesday classes to also come to the Wednesday dances when half term arrives thus putting the theory into practice. If they take that first step, you may see them nervously sitting down at the side probably missing the next dance. If you are an experienced dancer then please invite them. You will be experienced enough to recognise those dances where less experienced dancers can be successfully guided through a dance and you will be rewarded by the look of achievement on their faces.

We all know the debate about the practice of pre-booking dances. Whatever you do, please leave room in your dance programmes for spontaneity whereby you can invite new dancers.

To help things along, at Branch dances, distinctive badges will be issued to experienced dancers who volunteer to act as 'Helpers'. To give confidence, new dancers will be able to approach a 'Helper' if they are hesitant but wish to try a dance. I shall start this experiment with the new season's opening dance on 21 September but it will be more relevant at the Autumn Wednesday dance on 23 October when the classes have their half term break. If you wish to support me in this idea do please drop me a line.

Our 90th Anniversary approaches. Do come and join in but also please consider volunteering to help!

London Branch Financial Review 2018-2019 by Simon Wales, Branch Treasurer

At 31 March 2019 the Branch's net worth of £74,632 (2018 £68,485) was represented by the undernoted funds. The value of these funds is supported by the Branch's holdings of investments and cash in

hand, shown in the Balance Sheet.

Reserves Policy

The policy for unrestricted reserves is to hold sufficient funds to enable the activities of the Branch to take place in the face of poor income generation in any year. The budget is balanced each year, but some of the spending plans on publicity and youth activities did not take place. This has resulted in an increase in the general reserves. These have also been increased this year by an unrealised gain on investments of £408.

The restricted reserves have been donated for specific purposes and are spent in accordance with the donor's request.

Results for the year

The accounts show a net incoming resource figure of £6,147 - including an unrealised gain on investments of £408. This also includes planned expenditure from our legacy funds of £887.

Whilst we budgeted for a balanced budget, income was up and costs down in most areas - in financial terms, the Burns' Ceilidh was very successful (although a number of the other dances were not so much) more people started attending classes and the Family Classes were better attended.

We have already decided to make use of this surplus by reinstating live music for all

classes at Park Walk, and by cancelling a planned increase in class fees. Family Classes are being increased to two a month. Classes

Fees, less hire of halls, less teachers and musicians' expenses: £14,111 - £9,024 - $\pounds 7,310 = \pounds 2,223$ deficit. This is well within budget, and is accounted for by an even spread of losses across all classes. The Day School made a healthy profit of £559 without which the classes deficit would have been £2.782.

Family Activities

(formerly Youth Activities)

Income less expenditure: £300 - £336 = £36 deficit. The class has had better attendance and the hall is remarkably good value. The Anniversary Fund for youth outreach remains largely unspent, and is being earmarked for the relaunch of the family dances and to run more family classes.

Dances

Income less expenditure: £8,400 - £7,214 = £1,186 surplus, which is way over budget estimates. The Burns' Night Dance did spectacularly well again this year, but the Christmas Dance had high costs which reduced its surplus. Some other dances still attracted too few dancers. The dances held on the half-term Wednesday evening are still proving popular but are not covering their cost.

Publicity and The Reel

The gross cost of publicity this year was £1,772 - and £885 after the Andrew Cockett fund contribution of £887 to the cost of the Open Air Dancing. *The Reel* made a profit of £780 after the apportionment of the Life Members' appeal. This appeal fund is nearly exhausted and will not be available next year.

Bookstall

This generated a small surplus of £105 and there was no need for further write-offs of old stock.

Demonstration Team

This appears as 'fundraising activities' ie $\pounds1,933 - \pounds1,183 = \pounds750$ surplus which is nearly double its budget.

Administration Costs

The only other figure to comment on is the admin costs of £355, down on last year. This is made up as follows:

Postage, secretarial and other £103, Insurance £123, AGM expenses £29, Examiner £100

Thanks to the hospitality of Peter Knight and Margaret Shaw, there were no costs for Branch Committee meetings this year.

Donations and Legacies

Donations and legacies raised a further £1,595. Most donations benefited from the tax reclaim from HMRC for gift aid. We also had £210 sundry income as compensation from an ongoing dispute with our bank.

We are very fortunate to have the various bequests which enable us to tackle projects in the knowledge that we have sufficient funds to back them up. Open Air Dancing in Kensington Gardens was funded by the Andrew Cockett donation which is now exhausted, and the Bill Ireland legacy remains largely untouched.

Membership

Membership income remained steady, and our Branch share of subscription income was slightly up at £2,549. This is mostly because of an accounting change where income is declared for the year it relates to, rather than the year in which it was paid. Adjustments to the timing of membership subscriptions to HQ has left us with a surplus of £164 in this year's accounts.

Investment Income

Investment income from Charifund Units was up, and contributed a total of £2,764 and along with this there was an unrealised gain on the book value of the investments of £408.

Many thanks to fellow officers and convenors, who are always on top of their paperwork and enabled me to keep the accounts on the straight and narrow. As ever, the biggest thanks are due to Robert Elliott, the independent examiner, who does so much to pull these accounts together.

Ethical packaging

You will have noticed that this issue of The Reel (and future issues) has come to you in a slightly cloudy coloured compostable polybag. This has been especially sourced by our printers. The bag should be disposed of either in with your garden waste or with your food waste or used to line your caddy. It meets EU compostability standard EN13432.

Music Matters

Keep Music Live! Golden Reflections

Nob

Skiffle music was my first musical interest. In the 1950s I was at primary school when the likes of Lonnie Donegan and Tommy Steele were regularly on television and radio. From this stemmed an interest in my wanting to play an instrument firstly, a guitar at the time. The lack of a guitar teacher in the area, curtailed following that through to music lessons. My Dad always had a yearning to play the accordion but the opportunity never arose. Once I voiced an interest in playing music he steered me towards playing the accordion by taking me to a Jimmy Shand concert at nine years old. Attending

a live concert for the first time I immediately was drawn to Scottish music and accordion playing. In 1955 the *Bluebell Polka* had just been in the hit parade and it dawned on me that I had witnessed the band live. Once my interest was evident my Dad found a piano teacher who was willing to teach me the accordion and he bought me my first Hohner Arietta 72 bass accordion. **My apprenticeship begins!** The first question my music teacher asked was, "did I know what I was taking on?" No, should have been my reply as I had no idea at all what I was taking on: hours and hours of practice and the mileage I was about to commit to on my new journey. My first public performance was at my primary school in July 1958, three months into lessons, for a retirement party of a teacher. I enjoyed the buzz of performing to an audience and my hunger to perform regularly made me more determined to do well. A well-known local dance band became aware of my keen interest and took me along to several local dances. My apprenticeship had begun!! The encouragement from these musicians 'The Cheviot Ranters Band' and their love of the music persuaded me to begin competing in local festivals and especially the Northumbrian Gathering in Alnwick in November 1960. This then led to competing in the junior competitions in Perth for the Scottish Championships. This made me a lot of friends and gained me a wealth of experience.

Our first band: At this point my younger brother Jon had begun taking drum lessons and we had a chance meeting at an Irish concert, we were playing at, with Alan Brown who was an Irish dancer but also an accomplished pianist. This was the formation of our first band 'The Whitehead Brothers' and to this day we have to explain that Alan was an 'adopted' Whitehead. This also led to a strong connection with the Catholic Fathers on Tyneside, especially the Cass brothers, and an annual gig in the Mayfair Ballroom attended by 800 plus Irish ceilidh dancers with several other parish ceilidh dances to follow for many years. Numerous gigs followed along with more competing which included one of my most memorable moments of winning the Senior Open Scottish Championship at Perth in October 1968; the accolade of being the first Englishman ever, to win this title which I managed to hold for forty years. Not because I was English, as I always say we live north of Hadrian's Wall and a huge percentage of our friends are Scots but because I was actually called a Sassenach at the time.

The Danelaw Band is born. A year later we had the chance of an audition for Opportunity Knocks and expanded the band with Joe Hornsby on fiddle and Ray Barker on bass. Thus, in April 1969 'The Danelaw Band' is born. And the many bookings and mileage began! A chance double booking of 'Andrew Rankine and his Band', with whom we had become friends, launched us onto the Scottish country dance scene. We had lots of encouragement from our heroes, namely Jimmy Shand, Andrew Rankine, Ian Powrie, Jim Johnstone to name but a few, who all visited our local area often. From then on we travelled the length and breadth of the country and abroad, taking the dancers with us, to many foreign parts. 'Take the Floor' During this fortunate career we also had the pleasure to record several 'Take the Floor' broadcasts for BBC Radio Scotland, and a couple of those became hugely memorable. The first one being the largest outside broadcast ever for TTF which took place in the Federation Brewery in Gateshead and was attended by an audience of 780 and the second outside broadcast from Alnwick Castle, my home town, home of the Duke and Duchess of Northumberland and also the birth place of Harry Potter filming. During the events of a busy musical career and change in lifestyle and careers of the band members, we had the occasions to change personnel and the musicians. I have been privileged to work with these people over the years, some of them becoming regular band members for extended periods. I must at this point mention Geoff Holter, who has looked after the family accordions for the lifetime of the band.

Memorable Events: I often get asked what my most memorable events are. To me the local dances are as important as the huge events. We had a regular local dance in the Newton-on-the-Moor village hall which was the next village to where my parents lived and the backbone of helping us become established as a well-known dance band. The name Danelaw was adopted by us in 1969 after some research by my brother Jon, at that time covering a Viking area we played regularly in from South Yorkshire to the Scottish Borders. Some of the venues we played in when we started to travel countrywide stand out including, the City Hall in Newcastle, the Floral Hall in Southport, Porchester Hall in London, the De Montfort Hall in Leicester to name but a few. It struck us as to how privileged we were to be gigging in these venues when we saw the likes of James Last and Tony Bennett billed for the following evenings. However, Jimmy Shand's words echoed through my head, "You can have your head as high in the clouds as you want son, as long as you keep your feet firmly on the ground"- sound advice and always remembered.

Also, I was honoured to be asked to join Freeland Barbour's 'Occasionals' in Washington DC to take part in the Smithsonian Folklife Festival in July 2003 - what an event and an experience I will always hold as one of my most treasured memories and likewise being invited to Shetland Accordion and Fiddle Festival on many occasions, again a privilege to be part of such an important annual festival with such a wealth of talent already on their Islands. More recently we have again been privileged to be booked to take a leading part in the Orkney Dance Festival since April 2015. As well as all of this a mention for a special friend Ian Barbour who has booked the band for over forty years for his Goathland weekends twice

a year and also provided programmes for all of our abroad dance trips and many weekends, the Guisborough Dance Club has been a good friend to the Danelaw Band, as have the Market Harborough Scottish Dance Club and Cambridge Scottish Society. What is my favourite tune? Well, I have too many to single one out, when pressed, I would probably choose *Angus MacLeod* composed by Andrew Rankine, catchy and whistled by many but so simple.

Our band plays on; I still get as much pleasure in playing today as I did when we first started our journey. Thousands of dances, old tyme, ceilidh, Scottish country, Irish and ballroom, hundreds of accordion clubs country wide, hundreds of weddings following on to special anniversaries, lots of CD and LP recordings and many, many long term friendships have built our lives as we know them today. Nothing is more exciting than packing the instruments and amplification into the back of the car and heading off in any direction for a dance week or event with the band members and our wives. We find ourselves excited, laughing at 'old' band travelling stories and still have a pride in what we are going to present and play at our gig. We have our loyal supporters and dancing friends to thank for joining us on our journey to this Golden Anniversary year, as it would have been mighty lonely and impossible without them all!!!! The Naming of Dances by Charles Foss

Further to Charles' Letter to *The Reel* in *Reel* 306 *p16* he has sent *The Reel* this article giving readers an insight into his father's reasons for naming many of his dances.



Interest has been expressed in the names chosen by my Father, Hugh Foss, for the

dances that he composed. After he retired and moved to *Glendarroch* he began to produce a number of dances which all required names. Many names honour people in dancing while some come from widespread sources. *Miss Fleming* being his future daughter-in-law. *Dougal Dalgetty, Dandie Dinmont* and *Lucy of Lammermoor* are from Scott novels. But many were selected by scouring the local ordnance survey map for names with a certain evocativeness. *Irongray, Stroangassel* and *Dundrennan* are nearby farms. *Dalry* is still occasionally referred to as *The Clachan* (the town). could see is called Bennan. The name Bennan is common to several local hills, so adding Airie gave it some distinction and from its summit one can gaze down upon Clatteringshaws loch. Had he lent forwards and looked hard left there would be a glimpse of Black Craig of Dee, but only when the trees were bare of leaves. To the right, from an upstairs window, *Curleywee*, the northernmost summit of the *Rhinns of Kells* range is nearly visible. Garple Burn is just down the road, crossing it to reach Ken Bridge, where across the valley is the tree covered Cairn Edward. Turning left into a side valley brings one to the sheltered village of Balmaclellan. If, instead, one can travel north and soon pass the handful of houses that comprise Kendoon. The loch of the same name is hidden from the main road continuing towards Carsphairn. Cairnsmore of Carsphairn dominates the view but on

at the grassroots, where our most important work happens. leaving that behind one enters the next county and espies Loch Doon. The castle stood in the loch until the water level was raised for a hydro-electric scheme. Then the ruins were moved, stone by stone, to a site on the loch's shore. It is unique in having eleven sides of equal length. The lonely, but beautiful, Loch Skerrow could be reached only by the railway, but that closed in 1966. Although only a crossing place for trains, with no road access, anglers could use the station, there being a platform long enough for one carriage, and then scramble down to the loch. Two houses accommodated the signalmen and their families while water columns replenished the locomotives. Probably, the only dance inspired by its name is the Celtic Brooch. An illustration of such a brooch appears on the cover.

The Reel Profile - Today's Dance Devisers: Mervyn Short in his own words



From time to time it is the intention of *The Reel* to invite a popular dance deviser, to reveal a little of themselves - their beginnings and stimuli. *The Reel* is very grateful to BHS Borders Branch

member Mervyn Short from Rustington, West Sussex for sending us his story. Mervyn in collaboration with *Green Ginger* has published 12 Scottish Country Dances with accompanying music, Mervyn has also had several dances published in RSCDS Books and the Strathspey Server shows in excess of 40.

As a child I learnt ballroom, old time and Latin American dancing but gave this up when I became a teenager. I started Scottish country dancing in 1977 at 17 and Highland at 18. My first teacher of Scottish dance, Margaret Ogilvie, was an all-round dance teacher so I also learnt some ballet, modern and tap dancing which helped with the Highland dancing. I was totally hooked on Scottish dancing and was dancing at every opportunity, sometimes seven nights a week. In 1980 I qualified to teach SCD with The Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing (ISTD) and a year later I qualified under Janet Cook to teach Highland dancing. In the nineties I decided to qualify with RSCDS and gained my Preliminary Certificate in 1993 and Full Certificate in 1995. My tutor for both courses was Bruce Frazer. Soon after I was invited to teach at Day/Weekend Schools and in 2006 I taught at St Andrews and the following year at Winter School. Since then I have been very lucky to be asked to teach all over the world. In 2016 and 2017 I was Depute Director of Summer School and in 2018 Coordinator of Winter School. I have served on Education and Training Committee twice and am an examiner for the Society's Teaching Examinations.

I started devising dances many years ago and published a book in 1985. At that time John Drewry's dances were very popular in West Sussex where I danced. Around the same time dances devised by Roy Goldring and Derek Haynes were also catching on. Like a number of other devisers I used John's idea of the 3rd and 4th couples starting on the opposite side and choreographed quite complex dances. After learning many dances by Goldring and Haynes with a 'twist' on a common formation I realised that dances could be effective and enjoyable without being too difficult. Over the years I have enjoyed dancing/teaching dances by other devisers particularly those of Jean Attwood. Ann Dix and Barry Priddey. I am sure some of their ideas have found their way into my dances.

My friends will know that I am very keen on dance programmes including a good variety of formations without duplications, mainly popular dances (to avoid lots of 'homework' or lengthy recaps) and old as well as a few new dances. I also like a good variety of types of tunes eg single and double jigs/ reels, pipe tunes, two-steps, strong strathspeys, pastorals and slow airs. When devising dances I like to use a good variety of formations. Some of my favourite formations to dance are corners pass and turn, parallel reels of three, set to and turn corners (especially in strathspey time), strathspey poussette and tourbillon. In my dances I try to include something new or a 'twist' on an old formation. Today, people seem to only like dances that 'flow', so to this end I try to include this feature. However, I think it is sad that dances that require anticipation, a change of direction or difficult phrasing do not become popular. If one looks at dances from the early RSCDS books some fall into this category *but* have stood the test of time.

Nowadays most of my dances are 32 bars long and use the longwise set. I used to write 40 bar dances but stopped when I learnt that it is more difficult to arrange music for this number of bars. As well as the conventional longwise set I have devised a couple of dances more suitable for demonstration than the ballroom and use different shapes, eg diamond and triangle. My dance, Sixsome Medley a 32 bar strathspey and 32 bar reel, starts in a diamond shape and uses four women and two men. It was devised for a demonstration when there was a shortage of men. I was very pleased to have this dance placed first in the annual Jack McConachie Memorial Sword 1993 competition organised by ISTD. Three more of my dances were placed first in subsequent years, A Jig for Heather, King Edward's Jig and Boundary Cottage. These dances and other 'placed' dances will be published by RSCDS in The Imperial Book of Scottish Country Dances, Volumes 4-5. This book became available from RSCDS bookshop at Summer School this summer.

Some people assume that a deviser needs a reason to devise a dance but this is not necessarily true. I have devised dances for a specific occasion, person, place or animals as in *Sunshine and Sweetie's Jig* Book 48. Usually ideas come to me and I then devise a dance using those movements. My dance, Mist o'er the Loch, RSCDS Diamond Jubilee Book, was devised during a guiet five minutes at work! If I sit down with the intention to devise a dance I very rarely have inspiration and the paper remains blank! Some teachers devise dances specifically to teach a particular formation. I try to avoid this as I like to teach dances that dancers might encounter at a dance. However, my dance Holyrood Strathspey Book 51 was devised because I wanted an easy strathspey that included the formation corners pass and turn.

Over the years I have used different methods of devising a dance. I might start with the first eight bars or conversely I might decide on the last formation but usually I devise the middle section first. This was certainly the case with, Mist o'er the Loch. In my latest dance, Ysobel Stewart of Fish Hoek Book 52, I started with the first eight bars. I wanted to include the formation, tourbillon as I felt it is not used enough. There is only one other RSCDS dance which includes the formation, The Sands of Morar Book 45. The next sixteen bars I derived inspiration from Midsummer Common bars 9-16 Book 49 and Portnacraig bars 17-24 Book 36. Bars 25-32 of Ysobel Stewart of Fish Hoek are a variation on Bars 25-32 of Mrs Stewart of Fasnacloich. I was delighted that this dance was included in Book 52 because of its association with Ysobel Stewart (co-founder RSCDS) and that it includes the tourbillon.

It would be very satisfying to invent a new formation but so far I have not been very successful! Scottish country dance is a traditional form of dance and I think it is very important to devise dances using traditional formations and in the traditional style. However, it is an evolving dance form and new formations keep it alive and fresh. I am very concerned that 8x32 strathspeys are disappearing from our programmes. I have devised strathspeys for three and four couples but my strathspeys published by RSCDS are all 8x32. When Stephen Webb asked me to write this article he also asked me to devise a new dance, please see The Dance Corner on p14. I decided that I wanted to use the corners in the middle section of the dance. I would not say that I have devised a new formation but the movements are a little different, perhaps it could be called 'Turn and Loop'. To start this formation I needed the 1st couple facing their first corners and there are many ways of doing this, eg set cast and turn, cross cast and turn, turn cast and turn, 'long' cast and turn or lead down the middle and up to face first corners. However, I enjoy dancing the last eight bars of Lady Mary Cochrane's Reel Book 26 and have used it for bars 1-8 of this new dance changing the right hand to left hand at the end. Having devised bars 1-24 I needed to position the dancers in their progressed positions to repeat the dance. After the setting on bars 25-28 I could have had the dancers 'chasing' to their new positions but I felt this was being overused so I opted for six hands round to the left halfway. I hope this will become a popular dance on programmes as well as a 'teaching dance'. Emphasis can be given to the dancing of the 'polite turn' correctly, good use of hands and arms in the turns, phrasing in the 'loop' formation and control in the hands round to the left halfway.

Finally, I would like to set out my views on music for new dances. In my early days of devising dances I did not have the luxury of a musician so I wrongly used music that I liked for other dances. If it is a dance that is rarely danced I still feel that this is acceptable but I think it is very wrong to use the tune for a well-known dance for a new dance. I remember seeing footage of Miss Milligan talking about dances and their tunes and she said that the tune always came first. I agree with her and when I hear a tune that I particularly like I start thinking about writing a dance for it. This is what happened with my new dance. The tune that I have used for Lochinver is one that Judith Muir played in a class and I instantly liked it. I have a penchant for minor keys anyway! As far as I know the tune has not been assigned as the 'original' for another dance. When I submit dances to RSCDS I usually do so without suggested tunes and I have always been happy with the tunes that are assigned to the dance.

I try not to devise many dances now as I feel that there are so many. However, I am sure the urge to write a new dance has not entirely disappeared. I think it is a pity that a lot of RSCDS dances are never danced. Years ago a very experienced teacher said to me that if you want a new dance just look at the early RSCDS books! A very true statement.

The Good Air of SCD in Argentina by Charly Candia

My beginnings. Definitely, I will be always grateful to my parents for sending me to a bilingual British college in Buenos Aires when I was a youngster. I can still remember during my childhood trying to do my first SCD steps dancing Petronella and The Dashing White Sergeant, getting ready for the next Ceilidh Caledonian. Such good memories! As time went by, more and more responsibilities came to my life and dancing had to be put off. After some years, I came across an old school friend (a BASCDancer) and he encouraged me to take up reeling and jigging again..., so here I am.

About our Dancing Group: BASCDancers, Buenos Aires Scottish Country Dancers, was born in 2005, and we are very enthusiastic and cheerful. We began as a group of people led by a dancer who was attending Summer School regularly and was planning to take her teaching certificate. One of our aims was to promote SCD in Buenos Aires so we started gathering once a week for two hours to dance and learn about the history of these dances, exchanging books, CDs and all kinds of information concerning Scottish culture. Our Teacher: Time went by and we have become an Affiliated Group to the RSCDS; also our teacher, María Sol Grimoldi, was awarded her teaching certificate, an event that marks a breakthrough in the history of SCD in South America because she is the only dancer with a teaching certificate granted by the RSCDS in the whole region. In 2014 some BASCDancers participated, for the first time, at the Summer School in St Andrews, and we



toyed with the idea of being able to represent our country and group every year from that moment on by having a group of us attending there regularly. We, generally around 20



dancers, meet once a week on a Friday from 8.00pm for a two-hour class in a dance studio*, where we improve footwork and learn new formations. We also hold a couple of special workshops a year along themes such as: Scottish Clans and Tartans, Scottish Legends and Fairy Tales, and A Tribute to Robert Burns. Once a year we meet to dance and walk or row in our Delta in Tigre, a city about 23 miles from Buenos Aires, and our end of the year party is called 'The Happy Meeting' as the dance name. Events like these strengthen the bonds of friendship among all dancers.

Happy dancing from the far away southern cone of the World! There may be many reasons why members have joined our group, some are dancers of other styles, some came out of a deep interest in British culture, some used to dance SCD at school and some as with me, missed it once the school years were over - what is certain is that we all dance to have great fun and make new friends.

ATA - The Australian Teachers' Alliance by Ros McKie ATA Secretary



Ed. This is the second of four consecutive articles where the SCD teaching associations around the world set out their stall and offer you a doorway to pass through to find out more.

Australia has seven Branches but it is such a big country (eg the distance between Perth Branch and Sydney Branch is over two and a half thousand miles or four hours' flying time) that the teachers feel very isolated. The one event each year that has a fair proportion of teachers attending is the Annual Winter School which the Branches take it in turn to organise. At the Hunter Valley School in 1990 (after several informal discussions in the late 1980s) several meetings were held to decide whether to form an Australian Teachers' Association. These meetings were chaired by Heather Byers from Melbourne, with teachers from every Branch contributing their ideas. It was resolved to form an association to be called the Australian Teachers' Association and an interim committee from Melbourne Branch was elected. At the 1991 Winter School in Dookie the Draft Constitution was presented

and adopted. It was decided that it would be run in three year cycles by the teachers of each Branch in turn. The first Branch to run it was Melbourne and Margaret Greer, the first secretary, did most of the initial setting up and running of it. Since then almost every Branch has taken a couple of turns in running it. At the moment it is the turn of the Hunter Valley Branch (a Branch centred on Newcastle, on the Hunter River 160km north of Sydney). The AGMs are usually held each year at whatever venue the Winter School is at.

Membership: It was decided that full membership should only be open to teachers who had completed some RSCDS training (ie Full Certificate (now Units 4 & 5) or Preliminary - now Units 1-3) but that others could join as Associate Members. This means that it is open to anyone who is interested in teaching matters and to unqualified teachers who are conducting a class. In 1999 ATA had to drop the word 'Association' from its title so since then we have been the 'Australian Teachers' Alliance'

Early Initiatives: One of ATA's early initiatives was in the realm of teacher training. Elma See (Hunter Valley) and Morag Napier (Sydney) were heavily involved with

the organising of weeklong schools to train candidates for both levels of the exam. ATA also ran weekends for tutors and when the new units came in a few years ago, there was a weekend on Unit 4 for both candidates and tutors. ATA has also run a variety of refresher courses for teachers. Some of these have been stand alone weekends but these depend on teachers having the means to travel to them so the more successful ones have been run immediately prior to a Winter School. The presenters of these courses have varied. Some have been run with Australian teachers volunteering to take a single session eg running a discussion on how to attract new dancers or presenting ideas on what 'progressive teaching' means. Others have been run by overseas teachers. Sometimes, ATA has taken advantage of a visiting examiner but at other times the teacher has been flown in from overseas.

Our Newsletter is a bi-annual publication of ATACHAT, just for teachers, written by teachers. Across the years there have been a variety of inspiring articles on various aspects of teaching. ATA can be contacted for more information at ata.rscds@gmail.com or at PO Box 97, Adamstown, NSW 2289



"In My Opinion" by Mike Plumley (IB Chair)



Dr Michael Plumley was raised in Hertfordshire, London & Oxford and started dancing in King's Lynn where he settled as a Consultant Anaesthetist. After a year or so, he went to an RSCDS group; an offshoot of Norwich Branch, where he really

discovered SCD. Opening Pilling for the first time was a moment of revelation as he could see there were many dances to master and realised there was step practice and technique too! Later, Mike attended RSCDS Winter and Summer Schools. On his International dancing travels, he met members of the RSCDS International Branch, becoming a member in 2007. The IB remains his primary Branch but is a second branch member of RSCDS Milton Keynes. Mike has been visiting SCD groups abroad for 13 years mainly in Europe and has also met many dancers from countries further afield such as Russia, Belarus, Argentina & Japan. Having recently retired and being keen to make more of a contribution to SCD he joined the IB Committee in 2017 and became the Chair a year later. Mike now finds himself involved in organising and planning IB dancing events.

Mike addresses: the value of having an International Branch

The International Branch's origins officially started in 2004. A number of similarly-minded dancers formed a group to represent dancers living and working abroad, who liked to travel and did not have a local branch to join to give them RSCDS representation. Jean Martin was the RSCDS Chair at the time and once the Branch was fully recognised and its constitution adopted in August 2005, RSCDS Headquarters encouraged HQ members to transfer to the IB thus, increasing their membership.

Susi Mayr was a very active and prominent founder member and was on the Management Board of the RSCDS in 2004/2005, ideally placed to help make this happen. The Susi Mayr Fund (SMF) was established in her memory after her tragic early death in 2012 (see *p6 Reel* 281). The aims of the SMF are to further SCD generally and especially the International aspects, so bringing together dancers and musicians from many different countries to enjoy the sociability of SCD. The IB has grown from 35 Founder Members from 10 countries to 462 members from

28 countries today. It is true that the RSCDS looks after the International aspects of SCD and Branches overseas look to the RSCDS for leadership and guidance but this model started in the days of Empire and is of a 'spoke and hub' type of organisation. The IB has its own relationship with the RSCDS at the centre but the IB has developed direct crosslinks with local smaller groups abroad, even if they are not recognised branches or affiliated groups, as well as with individual dancers. The aims of the IB match those of the RSCDS but the way of working is very different. An early user of email, IB started Skype committee meetings in 2014 and has constantly developed its website, ideal for reaching out to people anywhere in the world, as well as publishing a quarterly IB Newsletter. IB committee members travel to meet other dancers abroad and often host informal social events.

The IB continues to organise a variety of international events, seven to date. The 8th IB event will be held with the support of the local Buenos Aires group (see *p12*) during 20-28 September 2020. Looking further ahead we are researching IB events in Northern Italy (2022) and Cape Town (2024). The progressive rise in IB membership must mean that the IB has found its place in the SCD world - visit www.rscds-ib.org to find out more.

Please hand me the Teapot? by Stephen Webb

SCOTTISH COUNTRY DANCE

The Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh

Composed in Honour of the Wedding of HER ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCESS ELIZABETH ¹⁰ HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH Anyone that has read the light-hearted look at SCD, *The Swinging Sporran* by Andrew Campbell and Roddy Martine published in 1973 will know that on page 43 it describes what a teapot is, in dancing vernacular. It explains that it is a particular movement used in the dance *The Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh* 'so called because of the correct posture which should be taken up by a dancer to resemble a teapot. The left or right hand should be placed on the hip so that it resembles the handle and the other arm elevated to form a spout' this elevated hand is described as a policeman's halt grip. So it is with some surprise that teachers are often heard describing three hands across as teapots but these same dance teachers would be horrified if the dancers actually danced as the 'teapots' described above. Incidentally, the original 1948 description of the above dance simply states 'dance three hands across'.

If we look at the latest RSCDS Manual; cl 6.14 gives no guidance as to how these hands are given. But as teachers we know that hand positions when given in turning, rights and lefts and hands across are to be given at a comfortable position with arms slightly bent, generally at shoulder height but adjusted to suit the height of the shortest dancer. So all the dancer is left to know is how these hands should be joined and apart from the teapot hold above, which is rarely seen unless reeling, there are three options to choose from and they are:

1. The facing partners (across the set) give right (left) hands in a hand shake hold and the third dancer places their right hand on top. When beginning this figure from the sidelines rather than from the middle often

the two diagonal dancers first give hands across with the other dancer's hand placed on top.

In rights and lefts, a hand shake is firmly given and so it is for hands across with the opposite dancer on the diagonal. It follows therefore, that the first hand option above so closely resembles the standard handing to be the most appropriate. In theory as the music is played all hands should meet simultaneously in the middle at the end of bar 1 and in choosing this case the second hand option is best however any dancer with long finger nails can cause this hold to become most uncomfortable and for this reason it is best avoided. The third hand option gives a very firm joining of the three hands and is often seen in English country dancing. In the end the choice one makes should be agreeable to the other two dancers, comfortable to all and easily joined and released in a smooth way when dancing with the music. It is hoped that the above advice goes some way to resolve a moment of awkwardness on the dance floor. And may in due course become the basis for a clause in the Society's Manual on how to dance consistently!

It was so special.'

Watch The Reel next year for our decision on this. 
