## **Branch Day School Reports**

## Mixed Ability Class

St Helen's School is a very nice venue, clean, smart and with several halls suited to our needs and good dining facilities. The junior school assembly hall was pleasant though a little slippery.

Aileen Napper was our morning teacher. She was organised and soon had us warmed up and dancing. She had chosen dances with some challenges in the transition between one move and another. First came Fair Enough (Bk 51/4) with transition from skip-change to slip-step. Easy enough when going in the same direction but with a change of direction not so easy to do neatly and smoothly. The other dances we did were Lady C Bruce's Reel, and The Swan and the Tay each with its transition challenges. Aileen also had us work on basics such as footwork but reminded us that it is the upper half of the body that people notice most so posture, arms and eye contact are vital. Barbara Manning played a grand piano, using her wide repertoire of tunes, to suit the teacher's requirements and help us to enjoy the day.

Our afternoon teacher was Emma Allsop who used different dances but with similar aims. We danced A Castle in the Air (Bk 43/9), The Maid of the Mill (Bk 21/11), Chasing the Eclipse with a promenade chain progression, and then The College Hornpipe (Bk 20/12). The Maid of the Mill had a tricky start, first couple turn and cast two places then turn and cast back, all in eight bars needing some nifty footwork and long steps.

We all enjoyed working hard to improve our dancing.



## Musicians' Workshop

On Saturday 20 October a musicians' workshop was held at St Helen's School Northwood, a new venue. Musicians were led by Ian Robertson. Ian opened the workshop by welcoming all and setting

the objective, to work together to form a band to play for the evening dance whilst enjoying the experience. The musicians were a cross-section of player/ dancers and players. Instruments were accordion, fiddle, piano, concertina and snare drum. The workshop consisted of four hours of tuition split into morning and afternoon sessions to perfect the fourteen dances for the evening dance, a mixture of jigs, reels and strathspeys.

lan invited questions from the outset and focused the group on settling in. He encouraged listening to each other to improve playing together to create one sound. The morning session concentrated on principles of tempo, ensemble playing and building energy into the music to encourage the dancers. The afternoon session addressed starting and stopping together, playing the set tunes a number of times through and running order of tunes.

Both sessions included many tips and hints which lan demonstrated. He also threw in some dance demo to illustrate his points. Of course, no Scottish music workshop would be complete without discussion of the Scottish 'snap' and dotting the notes. After the first set of the morning played by the

group lan said, "You are too good, I am going home", which was a very encouraging comment for the group.

My highlight of the day was when the band played the strathspey Jean Martin of Aberdeen acoustically at the evening dance; for me it drew together the principles we had covered. I looked up from my music and it was being danced and played beautifully, rewarded by an encore. Special thanks to lan and to my fellow musicians for a lovely day.

## **Very Advanced Class**

I would like to say I had a fantastic time - the teachers were super. the musicians were great and the new venue was quite superb (albeit a slightly bumpy floor in one of the halls!). The classes were fun,

thought-provoking and instructive. Would I come again? - quite definitely yes. Change anything? - not particularly. Disappointment? - only that it is 12 months to the next one.

Both teachers included dances from previous centuries. Pat Houghton started with The Charmer (1719, Bk 29/6). Apparently a very simple dance, but full of challenging changes of feet and steps. She continued with The Mill of Towie (Dunedin Dances Bk 4), a new strathspey to most people. This was a lovely dance with a millwheel figure, which I would very much like to dance again.

Andrew Nolan taught Argyll's Bowling Green (1710-1720, Bk 15/10) and The Falkland Beauty (c1822-1831, Bk 4/11). Both were dances with technical challenges and tricky transitions. The Longwise Eightsome (c1841, Bk 18/7) reintroduced us to the poussette right round in quick time.



What do I think of these historical dances? From a skills perspective, they are interesting for experienced dancers and present technical challenges. As social dances, perhaps they

are now not quite so successful. Why? I suggest that when they were originally danced there was probably less emphasis on precise footwork, which is what makes them awkward for us. Do these dances still have a place today? That is something we can continue to discuss in the future.

I would like to finish with a very big thank you to Margaret and her team for organising such a wonderful day.

We all tend to look up to Coates Crescent, to Summer School and to the hierarchy of directors, convenors and examiners. While they are important, what matters most to the Society's mission of promoting Scottish country dancing is the week-by-week commitment of branches, affiliated groups and individual members throughout the world who are keeping dancing alive, often in modest surroundings and sometimes against the odds.

My first task as Chairman, therefore, is to thank you for all that you do on the Society's behalf. If you are teaching or playing for a class, organising events or making the tea, performing in demonstrations or offering a helpful hand at a dance you are an ambassador for the Society. Newcomers take up Scottish country dancing and join the Society because of what you do, not because of me, or the Management Board or the staff at Headquarters, and that is the last time I will refer to RSCDS Headquarters. We have an excellent team working in the office at Coates Crescent, but they are not in charge of the Society. The RSCDS is headquartered

wherever people dance. The Society is you and it is nourished by the spirit and jollity of Scottish dance. It cannot be contained in a building or a minute book. Each branch and each member is empowered to do whatever they can to maintain and develop Scottish country dancing as the wonderful, lifeaffirming hobby that we know.

So, how did I get to wear the Chairman's chain (not chains, please note)? I learnt to dance at a children's class in Bradford, Yorkshire. By my mid-teens I was out dancing most Saturday nights. The opportunities seemed boundless. So many events, great teaching and music, the chance to travel, performances at some classy venues and friendships to share. As part of the London Branch demonstration team my wife, Wendy, and I had a ball. Life changes, of course, and careers and parenthood meant we had to take a step back. For some years my dancing experiences were mostly confined to ceilidh calling and supporting family dances. I knew that all the joy I had experienced through Scottish dancing would not have been possible without the RSCDS, its teachers and its nurturing of the tradition, so I continued to serve on the London Branch Committee and I edited the Society's magazine for a time. Life continued to change and with retirement looming I started to dance more regularly once again. It was a bit of a shock, frankly. Not only did my leg muscles complain, but my brain was taxed by the very different repertoire from the one I had known twenty years before. I persevered and became Branch Chairman for a second time and now Chairman of the Society.

What that potted biography shows, I hope, is that we enjoy Scottish dancing in many different ways. We might dance as a child, a young adult or elderly person (I am not quite that yet). We can ceilidh, we can reel, we can demonstrate in the Younger Hall at St Andrews. We can dance in a local church hall, or a park or a castle. We can dance in pretty much every country of the world or at home with our family. We can dance every night of the week, or just occasionally. We can be energised by the thrilling sound of a live band or we can relax to some favourite tunes played through our headphones. The challenge for us as a society is how to embrace the richness of the culture we have inherited, and to help it adapt to a changing world without compromising its essence.

We have some immediate problems to tackle. The continuing decline in the Society's membership is a big concern. Even more worrying is the apparent decline in the number of people Scottish country dancing in much of the 'old' dancing world of the UK, North America and Australasia. We need more feet on the floor, otherwise the Society and the RSCDS way of dancing are under threat. However, I would not have taken on this job if I was not optimistic about our future. We have a great product, we have a strong communal network and there is you. It is the dedication, enterprise and passion of our members that will see us through. I shall strive to make sure the Board, the office and the entire Coates Crescent apparatus do their best to help you.

## **Music Matters**

#### Summer School Musicians' Course 2018

Week 2 at St Andrews this year was full not only of Scottish country dancers but also about 30 musicians from around the world. Ian Muir, Music Director of the RSCDS and leader of the Craigellachie Band, organized and taught the musicians' course ably assisted by Gillian Stevenson on fiddle and Bill Ewan on piano. The main aim of the course was to encourage musicians to understand and appreciate the unique style of Scottish country dance music (the course in Week 1 was aimed at those who wished to learn more about playing for classes). Focused particularly on


reels, jigs and strathspeys it gave musicians the opportunity to ensure their music has the necessary drive and lift to inspire dancers. One of the main objectives was to have a working band to play for the week's final dance in the Younger Hall on Saturday night.

The course was primarily aimed at fiddlers, accordionists and keyboard players, but there was also a cellist and a bass guitarist. Participants came from Russia, Canada, South Africa, Netherlands, France, Germany, Sweden and the UK. Each morning we gathered in the Old Dining Room of University Hall to work on the music for the Saturday evening. The afternoons were equally busy as we looked at tempos not usually encountered in SCD music, such as waltz, two-step and march. We also split into groups for more specific instrument advice. In addition, class musicians, who had already spent the morning playing for dancing, came along and explained their approach to creating a set of tunes for a dance; an opportunity for us to play different tunes providing good sight-reading practice.

The sheet music for 65 different tunes, most arranged in sets for the 14 dances on the Saturday evening programme, arrived about six weeks before the course so gave us the opportunity to become familiar with the music in advance of our trip to Scotland. Thirty musicians can only play them together if they listen to each other - and that was probably the most important point lan made early in the week. The more we listened to each other, the better the sound we produced! The week was definitely not about bashing through the tunes, but about working through all of them carefully; every note counts whether it is loud or quiet, accented or played more softly. There were at least four different playing orders for the tunes

depending on the nature of the original, the key changes required and even the position of the dance in the programme. It was very important to take notes to ensure the accuracy that Ian encouraged. With so many musicians this was also an opportunity to make arrangements for some of the sets of tunes and we had great fun mastering lan's creative ideas hoping that dancers would realize that the sound from the stage was not just uniform, but varied in texture.

In the evenings we could join the social dancing, after which several of us gathered in the

This was an excellent course: thanks must go to everyone involved in its organization and to Ian in particular for guiding us so expertly. I am definitely a dancer at heart, but I have had such pleasure from challenging myself to play the keyboard. Over the last few years I have also attended many one-day workshops that give an insight into how the musicians see the dancers and how they work hard to produce the music that we love to dance to. If one plays a suitable instrument and would like to try to play for Scottish dancing then these workshops are most enjoyable and help one understand how the music drives the dancing. Bursaries are available to dancers and musicians, in particular young musicians, to attend courses. I have now attended the Summer School Music Course for three successive years and each time I have had a fabulous week, returning home with even more enthusiasm for the music and the dancing.



There are so many positive facets of his recording that it is difficult to know from which angle to approach it, since each is so strong in its own way, yet contributes to an overall picture that is greater even than the sum of its parts. I cannot think of a recording I have enjoyed more for years.

The parts are taken by a dream team of players, led by Jim Lindsay, with the luxury of both Alison Smith and Gillian Ramsay on violins, David Hume on second accordion, Graham Berry on piano (and bass) and

Gordon Smith on drums. All get their moment in the spotlight, and play their part to perfection, in the style of a real chamber group, so there is interest for the listener throughout.



I particularly like the way that these touches are used to give each track its own character. I have to highlight Slytherin House, where Harry Potter

fans (a nod to the younger dancers here) will revel in the creepy texture of the original, with pizzicato strings supporting the tune. I heard some Mendelssohn at a chamber recital just recently and the effect was uncannily similar. That note of danger is carried through to what must surely be the first listing of John Williams (the Hollywood composer, not the guitarist) on a Scottish dance recording, with the *Hedwig's Theme* adapted for inclusion as an alternative.

The strathspey written for Ruby Wilkinson's time as Director of Summer School has an original tune by George Meikle. Graham leads off the tune on the piano, and Jim takes the 'blue' note in the tune as a cue for a jazz-inflected arrangement, in which he comes in to provide 'cool as you like' comment on the accordion. Elsewhere,

Graham features, in the manner of Jim himself in his days as pianist for Bobby Crowe, doubling the tune or providing a counter-melody. Elsewhere, the two accordions or two violins elaborate on tunes, and so the interest continues throughout.

I could list almost any track as evidence of the thoughtful approach taken to matching tunes, with great build-up to transitions, leading back to original tunes that are themselves highly effective and attractive. And with this line-up, I do not think I need to say anything about the rock-steady tempo and rhythmic drive - recognising that not all dancers are taking in all aspects of the music while trying to negotiate the dances.

The extra tracks may be useful for classes looking for warm-up or cool-down music, and I am pleased to hear *The Foula Reel* at the head of a great concluding set for the dance - time to brush up on that running step? There is so much to enjoy on this album that simply listening end to end will bring a smile to the face, but it is as likely to make you feel you want to be up dancing, and my experience of the dances in this book is that they make a very strong set, and several will, I am sure, prove popular.

Whether you buy recordings as a dancer, listener or teacher, or are interested in a first CD, I cannot recommend this highly enough.

## Hogmanay at Higham by Maureen Haynes

Higham Hall is situated on the northern edge of the western Lake District, between Keswick and Cockermouth and close to Bassenthwaite Lake. The hall was built about 1800, has four acres of wonderful gardens and spectacular views across the

neighbouring fells. For over 30 years Higham Hall was the Lake District's Residential College for Continuing Education owned by Cumbria County Council. In 2009 it became an independent educational trust and continues to provide a wide range of courses, including the Scottish dance course 'Hogmanay at Higham' which starts annually on 29 December, finishing after breakfast on New Year's Day.



**Hogmanay at Higham** was initiated in 1992 by Alasdair Galbraith, the manager at the

time, an enthusiastic Scot, not a dancer but he enjoyed playing the bagpipes and as a treat gave a rousing wake-up call each morning, much to the disgust of some of the residents! Derek Haynes tutored this first course, accompanied by Nancy Dickson at the piano. Derek continued to tutor the course up until 2005. He was followed by Ann Dix and since December 2013 Mervyn Short has been the tutor. I also assist all three tutors in the running of the course.

A variety of musicians have worked with the tutors, including Nancy Dickson, Jennifer Wilson, Pat Clark, Jack Judson, Gillian Cummins, Ian and Judith Muir and currently George Meikle who is our regular in -house musician, playing for classes and each evening's social dancing. The course, which is aimed at dancers with at least three years dancing experience, starts on the first evening with a welcoming reception, followed by dinner and social dancing. Classes take place on the following two mornings with free time each afternoon giving opportunity to walk and explore the local area, to visit Keswick or Cockermouth, or just to rest. Optional 'walk through' sessions or classes are held after tea and then social dancing follows dinner each evening. Because of the size of the dance floor numbers of dancers are limited to approximately 40, but this in itself helps to create a very friendly and happy atmosphere both in the dancing and throughout the house over the three days.

New Year's Eve is made more special by starting with a wine reception and a more formal celebratory dinner, followed by dancing and seeing in the New Year in a



traditional way. Opportunity is given for bar breaks and often ceilidh items have been included during the evening programme. In 2016 all course members were given the opportunity to be involved in a competition to devise a dance to mark the 25th Anniversary of Hogmanay at Higham. This resulted in the publication of the four dances (After Twenty Five Years, The Higham Silver Celebration, Celebration at Higham and Higham Hogmanay) in a booklet entitled 'Higham Hall Anniversary Booklet'. All proceeds from the sale of this are donated to the Mountain Rescue Team of Cockermouth.

The course continues to be highly successful and is always eagerly anticipated by course participants. In addition, to experiencing excellent tuition and wonderful music it is seen as a good way to work off some of the over-indulgences of Christmas and to relax and enjoy the company of fellow dance enthusiasts in beautiful surroundings.

## The Oxfordshire Branch - The first 50 years by Dennis Tucker

A Merger: The Oxfordshire Branch of the RSCDS was formed in 1968. At that time two ladies were teaching Scottish country dancing locally - Margaret Baker in Oxford and Margaret Gibbs in

Banbury. These two groups merged to become the Oxfordshire Branch. Both groups continued their own separate programmes under a common banner for some years but gradually the Oxford-based group became more readily identified as the Oxfordshire Branch - a recognition which has persisted. There had been Scottish dance classes in Oxford for a number of years alongside the University SCD Club. Margaret Baker had taught for some time in St Columba's Church Hall in Alfred Street near Carfax and had then moved on to the hall of St Giles' Church, Banbury Road, before finally settling in Summertown Church hall where we have danced for more than forty years.

Dancing Classes: During Margaret's time the distinguished teacher and dance deviser, Jack McConachie, a prominent figure in the Scottish dance branch of the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing, used to pay weekly visits to teach various classes in Oxford. The Branch still meets in Summertown every Thursday all year round. In the early years there were two teachers, Margaret Baker and Roy Clarke. When Margaret retired in 1986, I took over from her and in the years that followed no fewer than eight members of the Branch have qualified as teachers, Helen Houghton-Carr, Trisha Rawlings and Alice Stainer now playing a major role in our various classes. In the early 1980s the main class rarely exceeded two sets and the total Branch membership was 20-30. Nowadays, the membership is regularly 70-80, occasionally higher, with five or six sets regularly joining the general class, subdividing into Elementary, Improvers or Advanced. In Margaret's time the only musical equipment available was a portable gramophone which played 12" long-playing records, on which the needle would occasionally jump, causing some confusion. From there we have progressed through several stages to a powerful and sophisticated machine with the essential speed control.

In the early days our range of activities was not nearly as wide as it is now. We did hold an Annual Ball, often in the Morris Motors Social Club in Cowley, with good bands, such as McBain's and Frank Reid's. There was no summer social dancing. Classes ceased with our AGM in May and resumed in September. Summer dancing was started experimentally in response to popular request and has proved a lasting success. The present cycle of Oxford Day Schools started in the early eighties. The first in more recent years was organised by the University SCD Club with the wonderful Alastair MacFadyen teaching a small class of some 20 dancers. For the next three years the Branch and the University Club alternated in running the event but since 1986 the Branch has organised the day, which has steadily grown to include classes at three different levels, requiring two visiting teachers, generally from Scotland, and three musicians. It was not long before an evening dance was added to the programme, making the day a considerable undertaking. A list of visiting teachers includes dozens of names familiar to those who attend Summer School at St Andrews and it is pleasing to mention that no fewer than seven of these teachers have achieved the high distinction of being elected Chairman of the RSCDS.

For several years we ran a children's class on Saturday mornings but attendance was never very regular and numbers eventually



dwindled. Our Burns' Suppers and Dances started in 2003, moving in 2005 to Benson Parish Hall where we have enjoyed the very good facilities ever since. We started to hold a Summer Open Air Dance in the early 1990s, using various locations until our then Chairman, Professor Michael Argyle, a Fellow of Wolfson College, gained permission for us



to dance on the college's splendid riverside lawn. Latterly, we have moved to the pleasant grounds of Headington School. During the past 25 years the Branch has produced two books of dances devised mainly by its members: The Silver Jubilee Oxford Book of Dances, 1993 and, Oxford Connections (2013) which was organised and sponsored by Mick and Trisha Rawlings. The latter contains eight superb tunes composed by Ian Muir, with whom the Branch has been closely associated since the early 1980s, before the formation of the Craigellachie Band. Ian and the band have produced three noteworthy recordings for the Branch: Craigellachie in Oxford, 1992, The Silver Jubilee Book, 1993, and Oxford Connections,

In the fifty years of our existence we have grown enormously, not only in mere numbers but more especially in the huge expansion of our activities and the dancing opportunities that we offer. It is gratifying that we are still known as a welcoming branch, taking pains to make newcomers and beginners feel comfortable and willing to persevere. We have a reputation for organising successful events and I believe that we have played a proper part in 'maintaining the aims of preserving the standards and traditions of Scottish country dancing and encouraging in others the knowledge and enjoyment of Scotland's heritage in music and dance.'

## SERTA Workshop Report by Hilary Maidstone



The SERTA Workshop on 30 September 2018 was led by Malcolm Brown with music from Ian and Meryl Thomson. It covered three different areas; an update on the changes to the RSCDS teaching qualifications and

dances from Book 52.

However, Malcolm's main presentation was about dancing with disabilities. He had taught Scottish dancing to wheelchair users in Samara, Russia and we saw two videos showing this, one of a 'Legs and Wheels Ball' which was very impressive. Each wheelchair user had an able-bodied partner, all dressed up beautifully and it was most encouraging to see everyone enjoying dancing.

Malcolm has devised specific dances for wheelchair users, sometimes with 16 bars rather than eight for a formation, using reel or jig music only. He found advance and retire, rights and lefts, hands across work well but wheelchairs are not easy to turn in a small area, so reels are difficult.

To imagine what it is like to be disabled, we then danced in pairs, one with their eyes closed, the other guiding. Next, we attempted Malcolm's special dances in threes, two in promenade hold, so that we could imagine the space used by a wheelchair. There was much hilarity and I think we all learnt a lot from this exercise - I know I did.

Elizabeth Bennett, who has Parkinson's, kindly gave us some ideas on dancing with dancers with disabilities that may not be immediately apparent. (She has difficulties with balance).

We all saw that the benefits of dancing are not just in social interaction but also in encouraging people to do more. Thanks to all who helped to give us an insight into dancing with disabilities and another excellent workshop.



The Singapore St Andrews Society (SSAS) has been celebrating St Andrew for some 182 years in Singapore and what better way to do so than social dancing at the Tanglin Trust School on Thursday evenings 7.30 - 9.30pm mostly during term time. And staying on afterwards at the Col (Colonial) Bar - a basic tin hut in one of the few remaining jungle parts of the Little Red Dot Capital State (Singapore was named The Little Red Dot by

neighbouring Indonesia as, on a world map, the whole country could hide behind the traditional red dot which denoted the capital of any country). There is free parking at the school or it is easily accessible by one of the cheap taxis or a 50p MRT (tube) ride and a ten minute walk from One North Station with a chance to listen to a cacophony of cicadas in the bushes. Visitors are made truly welcome to this RSCDS Affiliated Group. Those coming along can be anything from very new to the extremely expert, with people dropping in from Dubai, Hong Kong and Australia when they are passing through. Contact Marion at dancing.ssas@gmail.com also looking at the Singapore St Andrews' YouTube dance videos on line, one will know there have been some excellent standards of display dancing. Most of the dem team have moved away (with the transient expat community, a 'best' friend is lost and another appears shortly afterwards) but the fabulous ball where the videos were filmed, lives on.

The St Andrew's Ball takes place near to St Andrew's Day at the stunning Island Ballroom, at the Orchard Shangri-La Hotel. It is the perfect use of jet lag as it starts at 7.00pm with the 390 guests enjoying cocktails and filling in dance cards, minces through



a sumptuous seven course dinner, glides through a haggis tribute, blasts through speeches and Gurkha Police pipes and drums until Neil Barron picks up around 11.00pm with a full programme of Scottish dances and a brief stop for soup and rolls in the wee small hours. It is usual to stay on after

3.30am for picnic food and fizz brought along for the wind down. Time just flies! 'If you haven't been to this ball, you haven't lived'.

Tickets go on sale via Facebook and <a href="https://www.standrewssociety.org.sg">www.standrewssociety.org.sg</a> and the date is always the Saturday in November nearest to St Andrew's Day. The dress code is highland dress/black tie/ long dresses. Neil Barron and his SCD Band has had the ball in their forward diary for over 20 years and in recent years Maggie Adamson has added her fabulous fiddle playing, which is truly the icing on the cake. Dances are listed on the website as soon as they are decided and recapped/called on the night; they are the ones most people know so that dancers who dance

only once a year can enjoy themselves: nothing trickier than *Mairi's Wedding* or *The Eightsome Reel/Johnnie Walker*.

The current High Commissioner to Singapore, Scott Wightman, is

apparently the first ever Scot in the post. He gave an epic tribute to a haggis at the ball the year he arrived. Society members no longer need to lug 7kg tinned haggis each back in their luggage from Scotland t ensure ample supplies for the ball (and Burns' Supper - another great glamorous sold-out evening) as MacSweens is now available in Singapore. Ball dance practices start mid-October for six Thursdays (in place of the usual class) with the Col Bar table stretching out into the balmy night. As years have gone by, ball dances have grown easier and last year the organisers moved towards ceilidh dancing. However, the move this year was for the experienced Scottish country dancers dancing some more challenging dances to the usual band.

The Society has for the last six years in August given Singaporean students joining

Scottish universities a great send off by arranging ceilidh dancing at their event. The Society provides a caller and regular dancers disperse themselves around the sets. Readers are invited to check out the Society website for events as they appear or join their Facebook page www.facebook.com/singstandrews. Current Chieftain, Stephen Fulton and his merry band of committee members are always inventing new ways to celebrate all things Scottish (no one needs to be a member of the Society but everyone is welcome to all events).

## Jean Milligan 1886 - 1978

This year marks 40 years since Dr Jean Callander Milligan passed on to teach SCD to angels. *The Reel* marks this with a reprint of past editor Wilson Nicol's tribute to her, written in 2009 in *The Reel* 268.

JEAN MILLIGAN the tireless champion of SCD.

The co-founder of the RSCDS, Miss Jean Milligan was indeed a remarkable woman. She was in her mid-thirties when the Society was founded in 1923 and was still directing the Annual St Andrews

Summer School in 1977 at the age of 91, just after she had been granted honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Aberdeen. In 1973 she was


elected Scotswoman of the year on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the Society. It was claimed that resulting from her frequent international travels to visit her SCD 'family' she probably knew more people in the world than Her Majesty the Queen - and she had an incredible memory for people's names. Spreading the SCD gospel internationally was superb marketing by her - and these visits continued until well into her

eighties. In 1975 she had a five week trip to North America experiencing frozen rivers and snow in Canada while visiting New Brunswick, Toronto, Vancouver then in the USA to Los Angeles, Washington and New York where the temperatures were in excess of 30°C. At one stage, after a class of 275 dancers in Toronto she was driven for eight hours in a car to New York for another class! Returning to Glasgow, all in one week she examined teachers at Jordanhill on Monday

and Tuesday, then to
Craiglockhart College in
Edinburgh for the same
purpose on Wednesday and on
Thursday to the Society
offices to continue preparing

for the Summer School. By Friday she was back home dealing with a mountain of correspondence following her American tour, then back to Edinburgh for a finance meeting on Saturday - and all this at the age of 89! We have been able to contact Irene Caithness (Grant), Miss Milligan's 'Strathspey Queen' who has written on page 6 about her friendship with Auntie Jeannie as she was known by her dancing 'family'.

"In My Opinion" by Eric Finley

Eric was born and brought up in Prestwick and started SCD at twelve, three years later he was invited to join Margaret Anderson of Ayr's dem class and after a rest bite returned to it, joining a class at the

age of 20 near to his work. As a member of North West Ayr Branch under the tutelage of Norah Dunn he passed the Prelim and Final Teachers' Certificates in 1982 and '84 resp. Eric was then the local Branch teacher which he carried on with for many years until he was first asked to teach at the Isle of Wight Weekend (see article by Ian Muir). Since then, Eric has taught at St Andrews Summer School, in Australia, Canada, Germany, France and many other European countries including all parts of the UK. Eric enjoys teaching by trying to inform, correct, and instil his love and enjoyment of SCD wherever he goes.

#### The Importance of a Good Warm Up

'Warm Up' is one of the phrases that strike fear and trepidation in the hearts of most Scottish country dancers. As a teacher, it becomes quite obvious that people do not want to do a warm up because of their habitual late arrival at classes hoping to avoid it. Why should this be? Over my years of teaching I have learned that people do not enjoy a warm up or feel that it takes away time from their dancing and yet it is one of the things that can be of benefit to a dancer by preventing injury. It is not only dancers who have hang ups about the warm up; some teachers also have a fear of those dreaded two words, mainly because they do not understand the process but accept it is something that should be done.

What is the purpose of a warm up one may ask? Well, the simple answer is that it is a way of preparing the body for a strenuous activity such as SCD. No self respecting athlete would consider performing without a substantial warm up to prepare their body for the stresses put upon it by their sport, yet dancers are quite prepared to launch into SCD from cold and this can lead to all sorts of problems.

Those people who know me will confirm that I do quite a lengthy warm up because, through personal experience and going on what people who have been in my classes tell me, it works. I have developed my warm up over many years and have adjusted and tweaked it where necessary. A good warm up should start gently and gradually build up and should encompass a whole range of movements, involve the whole body, use as many muscle groups as possible and involve an element of stretching. Since muscles act in pairs, the exercises should work both muscles and not just one muscle of the pair. Warm ups can be fun as well as being beneficial - just ask people who have been in my classes. I am not saying that injuries will never occur because of the warm up but they can be greatly reduced and so in my opinion a good warm up is essential before beginning to do any SCD, which as we all know is a demanding form of exercise.



#### **CAN YOU HELP? UPDATE**

Referring to *Reel* 304 *p5* when readers were asked to identify three staff in the 1973 St Andrews Summer School photograph. In *Reel* 305 we confirmed No.3 as Peg Rae and we are grateful to Linda Gaul of Pitlochry and Margaret Church of Skelmorlie for confirming that No.1 ie sitting next to Margaret is Isobel Walker of Dalry, Ayrshire and indeed No.2 is Nancy Dickson. A minor other amendment is that although there was a Jackie Johnston (a dance teacher), the John Johnston in the picture was not known as Jackie - he came from Leicester/Belfast (see *Reel* 214 *p6*). In addition, bottom right is Doris not Dorothy Kinghorn. This photograph can now be given to the RSCDS HQ Archives.

## The Missing MacNaberries plus Hugh Foss

In Reel 305 we asked about the dance The Eight Men of Moidart described in RSCDS Bk 3/10 but from reference to Traditional Dancing in Scotland 1964 by Joan and Tom Flett it is clear that there were several dances by this name, none of which, including this RSCDS's 1754 version, are associated with Mary MacNab's collection although Mrs MacNab is known to have taught one version (also see Reel 24 p3, the second part of the Joan and Tom Flett's worthwhile . article on both traditional dancing and Mary MacNab). Following on from an assembling of historical papers by Chris Brady of Hayes and Fiona Grant, Bristol Branch further information has come to light from the late Elizabeth (Beth) Sutorius, niece of Mary MacNab. Within these documents was a copy

of Waltz Cotillion collected by Mary Isdale (maiden name) this is a different dance from that published by John Mitchell in Reel 258.

Finally, at this stage, found within these documents was a copy of the 32 bar jig *The Banks of the Devon* by Hugh Foss (this has been added to Strathspey Server) which had been sent with Hugh's compliments to Mary MacNab and which had originally formed part of *Dances to Song Tunes* 1966 (recently republished by RSCDS) included in place of *My Mither's aye Glow'rin Owre Me.* The information which includes *inter alia* handwritten MacNab notes, early dance descriptions and historical letters are to be lodged with HQ Archives. In the light of this and other discoveries the promised complete updated list will now be published in a later edition of *The Reel*.

# Lives Remembered

### A Gentle Man

same time. For Owen, doing things the right way was doing them in the RSCDS way; he was

a true RSCDS man and represented all that is good in the Society. Owen was brought, rather unwillingly to the UK from his native South Africa as a teenager, when his parents moved to the UK in the 1960's but quickly found many opportunities to indulge his artistic leanings - it was not until recent years that he returned to South Africa to visit. By then he had married Christine, brought up a family of two daughters, Anne and Alexandra, and was an extremely proud and doting grandfather.

I first met Owen in 1985 when I joined the demonstration team of London Branch and had little idea then how much our dancing lives would overlap. We were both at the taller end of the team, and danced many performances alongside each other, and always with helpful, quiet words of encouragement from the senior pro to the rookie which was much appreciated. Bill Ireland's demonstration team classes were not the place for socialising, but this took place in the pub after, or at the legendary pancake parties in Joan Spencer's flat -Owen did love a good gossip; never malicious, but always caring and remarkably well informed. Serious about teaching and performing, Owen was nevertheless not averse to joining in the fun side of things taking part in ceilidh items (ending up face down on top of his partner in one memorable blindfold ceilidh item!) and dressing up, always stylishly, at the Cairngorm Hogmanays.

Being a keen photographer and passionate about the royal family, imagine Owen's delight to discover that Princess Anne was the guest of honour at the Prix de Diane race meeting at Longchamp where the demonstration team performed on the racecourse. Time and again he went missing, trying to get that elusive picture!

He had a spell teaching the demonstration team, and the advanced class, but it was with beginners and intermediate level that he really excelled. Watching him manage a class of 40 beginners (yes really, and that was not so long ago!) as I waited to start my intermediate class at Marlborough School, Sloane Avenue, was like a weekly master class - he controlled without dominating; he taught without lecturing; and he made everyone feel that they really could do what he was asking! Apart from teaching, Owen also contributed vastly to the administration of the Branch. I discovered he had been an early predecessor of mine as Branch Treasurer, and he returned to the Committee as Vice Chairman from 1999-2002, combining this role with Membership Secretary, and sitting on the classes committee. In fact, he continued to be Membership Secretary up until 2007 despite not being on the committee. In many ways this was the ideal job for him to combine his love of the RSCDS and interest in people! Owen was a very supportive Vice Chairman to me as Chairman, and a steady hand on the tiller as Chairman from 2002-2005.

Conscientious as ever, he ensured he could attend RSCDS AGMs and I was amazed to see how many people from all parts of the RSCDS knew him, and respected him. I was pleased to return the support he gave me when I was Chairman, by becoming Treasurer. He was always happy to speak to members at events and was always encouraging newer dancers. Following the end of his term as Chairman, he was immediately elected as an Honorary Vice President, a post he held until his recent death. Sadly, his illness prevented him from making many appearances at events in recent years, so many current dancers will be unaware how much of a contribution Owen made to the Branch, but his memory will live on in the pages of The Reel, and in the memories of those fortunate and honoured to call him a friend. He was a true gentleman - a gentle man who will be missed by his family and by many friends in the RSCDS family too.

## The Dancing Couple from Andy Nicol

Dr Wilson Menzies Nicol 30 January 1931 - 15 August 2018

Wilson as a child, lived in Friockheim, Angus, where his father owned the village butcher's shop. It was from his Dad and the many bands who visited the village to play for dances, that Wilson developed his life-long passion for music. Ăs a teenager Wilson regularly played

piano in bands with local musicians, including his school friend, Lindsay Ross. Having been blessed with both an academic and practical mind, Wilson excelled at the local village school and then Arbroath Academy. His passion in scientific and mathematical subjects led him to study physics at the University of St Andrews, first as an undergraduate and then successfully completing a PhD. Wilson's delight in Scottish dancing started at the early age of five when he attended dancing classes at the village hall taught by the itinerant dancing master. On arriving at university, he quickly became involved in the dancing scene, organizing weekly dances and producing the tickets on a typeset printing machine that he acquired for the purpose. Wilson had great service and organizational skills and was elected the President of the St Andrews Celtic Society. He was keen to spread the enjoyment of dancing and successfully passed his full teaching certificate exam at the St Andrews Summer School in 1956. It was here that Wilson met Jean his wife to be and they married the following year. They both shared the passion for dancing and made a dynamic team, Jean teaching and Wilson playing for classes. This year in July they celebrated 61 years of happy marriage. Both were members of the London Branch demonstration class, Wilson serving in the team for 30 years and earning the nick name from Bill Ireland as 'Auld Nick'. Wilson contributed to the RSCDS on the General Purposes Committee followed by Management Board from 1999-2004. He served the London Branch as Vice Chairman/ Membership Secretary from 1989-1993 then Chairman of the Branch from 1993-1996 (see p3) and then as editor for The Reel (2005-2012). As editor he was keen to generate discussion and welcomed controversial letters to the magazine. He himself had strong opinions and interpretations on dancing. One of his favourites was the man not starting the reeltime-poussette on the left foot which he considered quite incorrect! Wilson had the position as one of the Honorary Vice Presidents bestowed upon him in 2013 as well as receiving a Branch Award for his contribution to the London Branch.

Wilson moved south to the London area after completing his PhD and the majority of his working career was with Tate & Lyle as Director of Research, leading the development of Sucralose. His specialist knowledge in the food industry led him to serve on several industry committees providing Wilson with numerous industry contacts proving invaluable when he started his own consultancy at the age of 60. He maintained a life long association with the University of St Andrews sitting on the Business Committee for many years. One of his greatest enjoyments was seeing

the success of his family including his eight grandchildren. Wilson was genuinely interested in helping other people succeed and promoting their success. He even had a brief foray into the film industry when the London Branch was asked to provide dancers for the Scottish wedding part of the film, Four Weddings and a Funeral. For relaxation, Wilson enjoyed developing and tending well filled gardens to flower and hold interest throughout the year. His relaxation continued indoors where he loved to play both the piano and the button accordion. He regularly attended the annual music course at St Andrews contributing much as well as enjoying playing in a group with the other musicians. He loved to travel and had an amazing memory for place names he visited as long ago as 65 years. Wilson travelled and danced extensively in North America and as far away as New Zealand where he and Jean enjoyed visiting family. He had a very sweet tooth and on one birthday he seriously toyed with the idea of only ordering three desserts.

transition. Jean Jean at age 80 attended the dancing school at St Andrews in 1956 to take her preliminary teaching certificate and came to the attention of a young Wilson Nicol. He asked her to one of the evening dances where they must have enjoyed dancing together sufficiently for Wilson to show Jean around his favourité parts of the Angus and Fife areas, after the school had finished. They were engaged by the end of the year and married the following year in 1957. To demonstrate their commitment to dancing, they honeymooned at the Summer School. Jean decided that the children in Reading, where they were then living, needed the opportunity to learn SCD and started a weekly class at her church. These classes proved to be very popular and Jean continued for many years, regularly organising a team of children to dance at the church Summer Fayre and competitions as well as making all the team dresses, such was her commitment to children. Jean served the London Branch as Membership Secretary from 1993-1999. In retirement Jean & Wilson enjoyed many activities together, including crosswords each day, listening to music, visiting gardens and of

course dancing whenever they could.

## **Editor and Friend** from Stephen Webb

Working with Wilson (or Auld Nick as he often wrote as) could never be described as dull. He had an active, forensic and logical mind and was well suited to being the editor of The Reel, the third longest serving editor, with 28 editions (see Reel 300 p3); despite



this, he often asked me to take over as editor, for which I have always appreciated his faith and confidence he had in me. Apart

submitting many articles, letters and photographs during his tenure I worked as the proof reader so got to know Wilson well. And as one might imagine we sometimes came into conflict but a sensible discussion always saw matters resolved amicably one

way or another. This led Wilson to produce 'house' guidelines which I still use today as the basis for consistency. I found him to be humorous in an academic way, warm in his strength of character, friendly and likeable. We often joked, in a Hannibal Smith manner that we 'loved it when a plan came together' because John Reeve, Wilson and I were, A Reel Team (see photo taken by Owen Meyer in *Reel* 262 *p20*). I got on well with him and have good memories at what we all achieved and very pleased that the Branch deservedly made him an Award recipient in 2016. I certainly saw Wilson as a friend and am much saddened at his departure.

## The Sad Demise After 108 Years

Dear Editors,

I write this letter with great sadness. The St Andrew Society (London), one of the oldest Scottish Societies in London and which celebrated its Centenary in March 2010, voted at its AGM in June this year to cease its activities.

The Society was founded by members of the Presbyterian (now Trinity United Reformed) Church in Mansel Road. Wimbledon. Early activities included picnics on Wimbledon Common and talks on Scottish subjects, which were advertised in the local newspaper. In 1913 one of these talks was given by Dr William Speirs Bruce, leader of the Scottish National Antarctic Expedition, the centenary of which is commemorated in The Scotia Suite of Scottish Country Dances. A ceremony was held at 'St Andrew's Grove', near Caesar's Well, Wimbledon Common on 20 June 1914 to commemorate the 600th Anniversary of the Battle of Bannockburn. In *Reel* 271 there is an article entitled 'Around the Birth of the Branch'. It describes how Mrs Elizabeth MacLachlan, President of the St Andrew Society from April 1926, was very active in organising Scottish country dancing in London and attended St Andrews Summer School. There is a followup article about Mrs MacLachlan and the Centenary Ball in Reel 272 pp8, 16&20 with a newspaper photograph discovered by the then RSCDS Archivist, Marilyn Healy. Mrs MacLachlan was appointed President following the resignation of the Rt Hon Ramsay MacDonald MP because of his parliamentary duties.

I am very sorry to see a society with such distinguished precedents come to an end. Time catches up with us all, and Scottish country dancing is less of a mainstream activity than it once was.

## Dance Floors -We Wooden Know

Dear Editorial Team,

In the spring of 2014 RSCDS New York Branch conducted a survey of its members. Like most things requiring participation (unlike instigating participation) there was a limited response with 25 results being returned. Nevertheless, we can assume that it was representative because those that did not

reply were either apathetic or happy as things stood.

Of the 12 questions which covered pace of classes, level of dance difficulty danced, sufficiency of ball programme preparation I was particularly interested in the one on venue where two thirds thought a sprung wooden floor very important and the remaining third felt it to be somewhat important nobody ticked the not important at all box.

Since February I have been suffering from Achilles' tendinopathy (the rehabilitation from which being eccentric exercising) and it is a real nuisance as it exercising) and it is a real nursance as its hampering my dancing. I see great events coming and going and my having to pass on getting a ticket. SCD is such that it has an addictive quality which is only fully realised when the dancing is denied. The floor in question where this injury (despite my warming up) occurred was a wood block on concrete base floor, fine for school assemblies but questionably suitable for dancing. Certainly, the dancing that Scottish country dancers do with lifts, springs and beating where some 'give' in the floor lessens the effect on the limb joints is of great help. Anyone that has danced at the Hitchin Town Hall, St Columba's Lower Hall in London, St Andrews Younger Hall, Cecil Sharp House, Ashlyns Hall in Berkhamsted, Hurlingham or even the many village halls around the country with suspended floors will know instantly the difference between a wooden sprung' floor and a floor with a concrete slab.

It is difficult to know from an advertisement for a dance what kind of floor one will be met with when one arrives and it is only from experience that dancers, for self preservation, can and should strike a line through that hard floor event for the following year. I fully understand why a club will not advertise that the event has a 'hard' floor (no one would go) but perhaps clubs could look at this issue differently and include in their adverts when the floor is wooden and sprung/ suspended that much at least is owed to the dancer to make an informed decision.
