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# READERS' LETTERS AND EDITORIAL COMMENT

Following our last Editorial we are glad that a number of people have put pen to paper; so many that we are unable to include all the letters received, but please keep writing and, as happens on radio request programmes, you might be lucky one day. A number of letters were received on the continuing saga of Reels of Four but no one has come up with a positive response to John Mitchell's meanderings. We therefore must close the subject by printing just one letter on it—from John Robertson who started it all in the first place.

John writes:—
"The correspondence on left-shoulder half reels of four seems to have run its course, so after setting the hare running, perhaps you will permit me a concluding word.

Firstly, my thanks to those who sent me the original instructions for Mairi's Wedding, which quite specifically state that left shoulders should be given in the half reels of four.

Secondly, I too didn't understand John Mitchell's response, and suspect that no one else did, which is probably why no one replied!

But finally, I must say that I totally disagree

But finally, I must say that I totally disagree that giving right shoulders improves the dance. It makes it easier, yes, but it completely loses the shape and phrasing of the dance. That feeling on the last bar of each four bar phrase, as you slice in precisely back to back with your partner, forming a neat diagonal line with your new corner, is what the delight of Scottish Dancing is all about. Where do you right-shoulder merchants get your phrasing from?

Thank you Diana (and others) for your support. I hope that my wife will continue left shoulders. At the very least I shall insist on it for half the time!"

"I am quite certain that I am not the only "Reel" subscriber who reads Record Review and Editorial as soon as a copy is received. (I confess in that order.)

Please don't think that because subscribers like myself are too lazy to put pen to paper when we disagree with you (I often do!) that your efforts aren't appreciated. You've given much food for thought and much pleasure by drawing attention to recordings that might otherwise have been missed. (An example of this is your mention of the three Alasdair Fraser recordings—I knew of two but the third—.)

Please keep up the good work!"

John Fenningworth writes:-

"Following your editorial in issue No 190 of "The Reel", I have to agree with yourselves of the need to vary dance programmes, as people tire of continually dancing the same dances.

In recent years the RSCDS has been one of the few clubs to put variety into their programmes and the continued high numbers at their dances justifies this action. While many other clubs, are losing out because their programmes show a distinct lack of imagination. This may be a reflection of people's attitudes, or, an unwillingness to use dances introduced by others, for it should not matter who introduces a dance into the London scene. If the dance is worthy of dancing, it should be available to be danced by all clubs at anytime, instead of flogging the old favourites to death.

When the RSCDS was formed, it was to promote the finer points of Scottish dancing; one way it has achieved this is by publishing many books of dancing. In recent books there are two dance titles which express what Scottish dancing is about. These are "It's Just For Fun" and "C'est l'Amour or The Flirt". Scottish dancing should be fun, also, as you are meant to be dancing with a partner. Surely you must flirt, as part of "doing things together". How can we do this, if we are constantly rushing to find the next partner and to get onto the floor, often before the next dance has been announced, Scottish dancing is meant to be graceful as well as social.

Finally, a comment to all organisers of Scottish dancing functions. To ensure the survival of Scottish dancing in the London area, as it should be danced, you need to ensure that

we stop the continual encoring of practically every dance on the programme. This will return what is a test of stamina, back to the social occasion Scottish dancing is meant to be."

A word from Rachel Wilton:—

"I agree that it would be a good idea to extend the present range of dances on programmes. At some branches and clubs a recap of each dance is offered. This avoids huddles of people learning the dance while the lines are being counted, allows people who are unsure of the dance to get up and generally means fewer mistakes will be made. The programme will be slightly shorter but the dancing will be more enjoyable for everyone."

EDITORIAL COMMENT

John Fenningworth and Rachel Wilton have both mentioned aspects of the social nature of dances in their letters and I endorse their views wholeheartedly. I see it as a matter of politeness to wait until the M.C. has announced the dance before making up sets. In this context I felt that the atmosphere at the R.S.C.D.S. Ceilidh was greatly enhanced by the fact that people could not make up sets prematurely as they were not sure what the next item would be. I am tempted to suggest no published order of dances, and calling of all dances, if only to prevent this premature making-up of sets.

Another habit which I feel detracts from the social side of a dance is the booking of dances far in advance, together with the habit of some couples to dance only with each other and no one else. The decision to encore a dance rests on the M.C. but I certainly feel that the encoring of dances should be the exception rather than the rule, leaving more time for enjoying the other aspects of what is, after all, a social occasion.

#### SOMETHING ELSE — THE FRANK REID SCOTTISH DANCE BAND

Whistlin' in the Kitchen, Wee Cooper of Fife, Ship of Grace, Peat Fire Flame, MacLeod's Fancy, Kilkenny Castle, Mrs MacPherson of Inveran, MacDonald of the Isles, Gaelic Waltz. (All dances full length.)

The three cassettes by the late George Fleming were recorded live at dances in April and May, 1988; there is some inevitable background noise but this does not detract in any way from the lively playing. The band make a very full sound with three accordions, fiddle, piano and drums. I have enjoyed listening to them and they will make a useful addition to the repertoire of clubs who use cassettes for classes and dances. Only black mark is for failing to play the correct tume for Round Reel of Eight. I can't think why they did so because they cope admirably with much more difficult ones.

A new Frank Reid record is always a welcome addition to the catalogues and this one will not disappoint his many fans and will hopefully gain him some new ones. The strathspeys are particularly well played. We have the song tune "The Boatie Rows" as the original for Ship of Grace instead of the correct tune but as several others have played it in the past it is now universally acceptable. Frank plays his own strong tune for Kilkenny Castle and I must admit to enjoying hearing "The Isle of Innisfree" as a strathspey; takes me back to my youth and the voice of Anne Shelton back in 1952. Frank's newest tune which he uses as an alternative for the Wee Cooper O' Fife is called "Deca Dance"-only a musical accountant could have thought that one up. Tempo is nice and steady and there is a goodly dosage of Reid "oomph".

Turning away from records strictly for dancers there are a number of new ones worth a mention. Bobby Crowe and his Band have produced a fine record entitled The Lasting Pride (LILP 5187) to celebrate the 25th anniversary of The Forth Road Bridge and the centenary of The Forth Railway Bridge with appropriately names tunes. Glasgow-City of Culture 1990 is also remembered. There are many other fine tracks for waltzes, two steps, polkas et al on this one.

John Ellis and his Highland Country Band's latest album (LILP 5183) is called Birlin' Sporrans and the sleeve is a worthy match for the rather twee title! I know John Ellis has many followers but I confess that his recordings always disappoint. Despite good tunes well researched and given an airing for perhaps the first time intermingled with familiar ones, and despite what should be exciting tempo and key changes there is a certain sameness about all the tunes. But I do love his Gaelic waltzes. I do not, however, like the practice adopted by this band of omitting the "lead-in" note at the beginning of a tune and I am glad that other bands are not following this trend.

Giving the veterans-Messrs Crowe and Ellis-a run for their money is Simon Howie (LAP 125) who plays mostly familiar and well known tunes with his brother on piano (Simon plays lead accordion) and a few session men up front and in the background too! Session men apart I like this one a lot. Pity the country dance tracks are not full length. A set for "The Reivers" is quite outstanding but it is only 5 × 32. Simon's handling of pipe marches is also worthy of note.

Someone remarked to me recently that once a band has made 8 or 10 records they must all sound a bit "samey". Not so if your name is Jim MacLeod who, incredibly it seems, has just had his 34th LP released. The title is Welcome to my World (ITV 461) and the songs include the title track, Steal Away, which has been featured on Radio 2, and If my World Should End Tomorrow. Pipe marches in 6/8 time reveal as ever the sheer excellence of Tommy Ford's accordion playing. Of most interest to dancers is an Eightsome Reel for which all the tunes are composed by members of the Band. It is impeccably played with a very steady tempo throughout.

Eighteen of the Best features eighteen different Bands (REH 762 on record) who have been on Radio Scotland's Take the Floor programme during the past year or so. A difficult decision making the choice and inevitably not necessarily the choice this reviewer would have made. Having said that the majority of the tracks make interesting, indeed exciting listening and I certainly couldn't name the "top band"! There are so many good ones. Purely from a Country dancers point of view Colin Finlayson's Roxburgh Castle, Neil Barron's Bonnie Lass and Graeme Mitchell's Dashing White Sergeant stand out-perhaps! But, Howie is here again as are a host of others too numerous to mention. If I must have a niggle about this one it is not about the music but about the sleeve. Having decided to use photographs by Colin Baxter (who is without dispute one of Britain's best landscape photographers) the BBC could have used more imagination and not used the photographs from the front and rear covers of Colin's latest book, especially when one of them is the much photographed shortbread tin view of Eilean Donan Castle, I have to say however that the actual photograph is superior to that which one finds on shortbread tins!

I am now going to risk the combined wrath of Anderson, Gillies, Gillies, McKellar and Morrison (to name but five) and say that a new cassette of traditional Scottish songs sung by Meston Reid is the best album of such ever issued. Meston has an excellent pedigree; born and brought up in Aberdeenshire, he was for some years principal tenor with D'Oyly Carte Opera Company and he has taken part in many concert performances. The songs include Scotland Yet, Ae Fond Kiss, Bonnie Mary of Argyll and the evocative Scottish Emigrant's Farewell which I have never before heard recorded. There is a danger with the types of song sung here that they can become over emotional, almost banal, if not handled properly, but Meston sings them all with dignity and poise. Piano accompaniment is by Patrick Healy.

P.S. As we go to press two records land on the

doorstep. One is a re-issue of a 1971 Jimmy Shand LP with eight full length dances and a Waltz Country Dance. The dances are White Heather Jig, Grosvenor House, The Campbell's are Coming, Balmoral Strathspey, Miss Hadden's Reel, Quite and Snug, Hooper's Jig and Galloway House. I see from Reel No. 118 that I said then that the tempo was better than on some of his (then) recent LPs but it lacked zest compared with a lot of his earlier recordings. Eighteen years on I can now say that I have used this record—at least some tracks-for dancing to and it is more than adequate. Perhaps I ought to bear in mind that the main purpose of such records is as an accompaniment for dancing and that that alone is the criteria. But is it? The No. of the record is GRALP 37.

Finally, from Canada, with accordionists Bobby Frew and Bobby Brown, fiddler Alasdair Fraser and a rhythm section, comes a record of 10 full length dances including Good Hearted Glasgow. No. is BRG 017 and we will review it in next issue. Sorry, but there just is not time to listen now and do it justice. Copies can be obtained from S.N.D.C.—see address in their advert.

The George Fleming cassettes are £5 each and all proceeds go to the Cardiac Unit at Crosshouse Hospital. They are obtainable from Ayrespin, 19 Gatehead Road, Crosshouse, Kilmarnock, Ayrshire.

#### HENRY GEORGE DRAPER

Harry Draper died on 15th November 1989,

Harry and his wife, Phyllis, came to London from Inverness in 1958. Almost immediately Phyllis became a Branch pianist and a couple of years later Harry was elected to the Branch Executive. Two years later he became Honorary Secretary and continued to serve in that capacity until his retirement in 1984. He served us well. As committee members came and went Harry provided wonderful continuity for the business affairs of the Branch, giving just over 25 years service in total.

Although a quiet man, Harry was strong in his convictions. He was conservative with a small 'c', a stickler for accuracy in playing the committee game according to the rules, keeping us all in order; the perfect right-hand man for the Chairman and a helping hand to the newcomers.

Apart from his annual comprehensive report at the AGM, he was usually in action at most functions-latterly no great dancer-at Day Schools he performed the role of Chief Barman and General Factotum, and at weekend schools he would be there because Phyllis would be there playing the piano. He was always at her side—they made a good team together.

When Harry retired they left London and finally settled, not in Inverness where they had first met, but in the nearby coastal town of

His last public appearance was just a few months ago at St Andrews. He was there to collect Phyllis after her stint of playing at the Summer School. She will miss him very much.

Harry leaves behind a wife-his dear Phyllis, a daughter and two grandsons. We offer them all our sincerest sympathy.

"REEL AID" — NORFOLK — 1989

Like London, the nearest branch, Norwich, found itself unable to arrange a special event. As a long-time member of the Society I would have been sorry not to have tried to do something, so I set about organising some dancing here in Mundesley. There are a handful of dancers scattered along the coast, and after all, just one set would do. The date proved unfortunate as nearly all the villages had a gala or fête, and many who would have liked to come couldn't. However, two couples from Norwich gave promises, plus one from here (the doctor and his wife); there were vague promises from acquaintances as far away as King's Lynn, and with myself, a set seemed possible, so I made plans. Belatedly I phoned Coates Crescent, who said, "Yes please, fill up a form" and I bought a cassette. Now although the aim was to take part in the dancing, it was with the object of raising money for a children's charity and we have just such a one here; the playground equipment in the park, which is the village memorial to the men of the Second World War, is now obsolete and beyond repair; the replacement cost is bad enough, but the now requisite "safe landing surface" is prohibitive. One set of dancers by themselves could not do much, but if the weather were kind, there was a golden opportunity—open-air dancing; I thought of the lawns on the cliffs, the rose gardens in the High Street, the park itself, the old people's home. Holidaymakers are usually generous and readily part with their coins for a good cause!

Matron was delighted at the idea; the chairman of the Parish Council was enthusiastic and promised the full baking of the P.C. and his own personal support on the day; there was only one snag-the P.C. didn't own the lawns on the cliffs, etc.; I would have to apply to the District

Council.

I duly phoned the Council offices; the switchboard answered and I explained my call. The voice at the other end sounded dubious but thought "Parks and Leisure" might help; P. & L. held a hurried conference in the background, then said, "We think you should try the Chairman of your Parish Council." "I have," I said, "and he tells me you own the cliff-top lawns." Another consultation, then, "In that case," said P. & L., "we'll send you a form."

It duly arrived—in triplicate; one copy for the Council, one for the police (crowd control for one set? I wondered), one for the fire-brigade (Scottish Dancing inflammatory?). Moreover, I was to publish a notice in the local press giving details (including my age!) and also place one on the chosen location. I would then receive a licence, on payment of £15. So much for charity!

There's nothing like rampant officialdom to rouse the Scottish fighting spirit. I thought of Rob Roy, the Devil's Beef Tub, and all those marauding cattle thieves; a quick dance here and there around the village could surely not do harm? There was, however, the question of the collection; it would not do to put myself on the wrong side of the law, or bring the Society into disrepute. I drove to the nearest police station. A smiling officer said, "Scottish Dancing? Very nice, but I'm afraid we don't issue the licences. You want the District Council."

This time, I wrote. Back came a form-two sides of foolscap and instructions: - collection points, sealed boxes, where and when handed in, seals to be broken in the presence of—and so on. (I'd planned on using a bucket.) Yet more! "Collectors must not be less than 25 yards apart and must not move about." It didn't sound like

Scottish Dancing.

I settled for a border raid.

Amongst the information from H.Q. I noticed that we were to be dancing at the same time as groups in Stockholm and Sydney. I duly sent postcards (with views of the village, including the beach, the cliffs, the park etc.) with our greetings and good wishes. I kept my fingers crossed for a fine day.

During the week, I met the doctor's wife; yes, they were coming all right—but he'd be on call; in my mind's eye I could see him going hastily down the middle—and not up. On Tuesday, one couple dropped out because of a last minute change in their holiday plans; on Friday, so did the other. My spirits sagged; there was no help for it. I rang the chairman of the P.C., I rang Matron, I tracked down someone to pass the word on to the King's Lynn folk; I took down

the posters.

Saturday dawned—a gorgeous day. I sat down to a rather belated and dull lunch, when the phone rang. "Where's the dancing?" asked the voice . . . I found two young women from Norwich seated, glass in hand, outside the "Lifeboat", children playing on the forecourt.
"We've had a change of plans. We said we'd
come if we possibly could," they said. My spirits rose. The sky was a brilliant blue without a cloud in sight, the North Sea might have been the Med., and the beach was a sheet of clear washed gold. We paddled and walked and climbed the cliffs; we bought ice-creams in the village sweet shop and ate them in the shade of the trees in the rose gardens, and we thought of all those busy, hot, aching, dancing feet.

It was a lovely day. A pity about the Child-

ren's Playground, though.

My first Christmas card came in mid-November—with greetings from the Secretary of the group in Australia. They too had been unable to organise their own event but some had travelled to other venues. It seems I was not alone in my trials!

I-8 All dance interlocking reels of four round the set (as in 1314). i.e.All pass partners by the right, the next person by the left, and dance round the third person by the right and start to travel in the opposite direction round the set. All pass the second person by the left and partners by the right to return to original places.

The women pull right shoulders back as they dance into place.

9-16 1st and 3rd couples dance modified rights and lefts as follows:—

Each dancer dances past the opposite person passing right shoulders. Immediately after passing that person, each dancer joins left hand with partner and all dance out to the opposite sides—the men bring their partners over in front as they curve into the opposite couple's place. All repeat these movements to return to own places.

1st and 3rd couples join both hands 17-24 with partners in promenade hold. 1st couple, dancing together, dance a reel of three across the dance with 2nd woman and 4th man. They begin by passing 4th man by the right and all finish in a line of four facing down the dance. 3rd couple, similarly, dance a reel of three across the dance with 2nd. man and 4th woman. They begin by passing 2nd man by the right and all finish in a line of four facing up the dance. (2nd and 4th couples curve round to join nearer hands with 1st or 3rd couples at the end of the reels—i.e. extra loops!)

N.B. 2nd and 4th couples, taking long initial steps, dance through the corner positions to enter the reels.

25-26 All set in lines of four facing down and up the dance.

Taking long steps, 1st and 3rd couples dance into the middle, then, joining nearer hands, 1st man and 3rd woman dance out into 2nd couple's place, while 1st woman and 3rd man dance out into 4th couple's place. Meanwhile, 2nd woman and 4th man dance towards one another to 1st couple's place and then into the middle, while 2nd man and 4th woman dance to meet in 3rd couple's place and then into the middle, so that, 2nd and 4th couples meet partners in the middle of the set.

1st man and 3rd woman, and 1st woman and 3rd man turn with both

meet partners in the middle of the set.

29-32 lst man and 3rd woman, and lst woman and 3rd man turn with both hands and dance to original places.

Meanwhile 2nd and 4th couples turn partners with both hands in the middle of the dance opening up to face original places, and then dance out to original places.

N.B. the turning on Bars 29-30 should be covered.

33-64 Repeat Bars 1-32 with 2nd and 4th couples leading.

65-68 The women dance right hands across and return to places.

69-72 The men dance left hands across and finish inside the set facing out.

73-76 All set with Highland Scottische steps. 77-80 All turn partners with both hands one

and a half times.

The women stay in the middle of the set and join right hands with partners ready for the bow and curtsey.

Dance devised by John Drewry and published with kind permission. The music is recorded on the Craigellachie Band's album "Encore".

#### PERTH WELCOMES AGM

The enormous, circular Sports Hall in Perth was the venue for the Society's AGM last November. The Grand March led by the Duke of Atholl's pipers and 600 people dancing Triumph were sights to be seen.

The Duke was present during the lively discussions which took place during the AGM. The five London delegates—in accordance with the views expressed by members at the Branch AGM last May—opposed the proposal from the Executive Council to abolish Long Term membership. The Society's deficit for last year was £15,700 and the Finance Committee thinks that it could save money by abolishing this form of membership. A sea of hands was raised in favour of the proposal, but the count proved to be 85 to 82 in favour of retaining it. A call for a recount was refused by the Earl of Mansfield.

The London Branch voted against a reduced subscription for young members between the ages of 16 and 25 and supported the motion from Birmingham to grant it to members between 16 and 21. Both motions failed. Birmingham's proposal to offer half-price membership to Senior Citizens was also rejected. The majority of the delegates were in favour of the same subscription for all.

The Open Forum which is now held at each AGM gives all members the opportunity to raise any issue. Some of the points raised were: producing a video for teaching children; a revised format for the AGM with a fringe programme of concerts etc; gymnastic colleges in Scotland no longer have compulsory classes in Scottish dancing; the widening gulf between what the Society teaches and the dancing at weddings, ceilidhs and other social occasions. In response to the last point, Alastair MacFayden, the Society's archivist, pointed out that the RSCDS is an educational charity and instruction was its first priority. If it had no been, very few people would be enjoying Scottish dancing today.
